#### savage

adj. extremely wild, ferocious, or uncivilized

#### wildfire

 a large, uncontrolled fire that spreads quickly through a natural area such as a forest, grassland, or mountain slope

synonym: blaze, bonfire, flame

#### devastation

 the act of causing great destruction or damage, often on a large scale

synonym: destruction, ruin, havoc

### wrought

adj. made or fashioned carefully or decoratively; (of materials) beaten out or shaped by hammering

#### reliant

#### electrify

#### peril

n. serious and great danger or risk

synonym: hazard, danger, threat

v. to cause or bring about something, often as a result of harmful or destructive actions or events

synonym: cause, inflict, bring about

#### havoc

 widespread destruction or devastation, often caused by natural disasters, war, or other violent events

#### portray

#### fleeting
