reinterpretation

- a new or different interpretation or explanation of something, especially a text or piece of artwork
 synonym: re-evaluation, re-assessment, re-examination
- (1) **reinterpretation** of history, (2) **reinterpretation** of the Constitution

The artist's **reinterpretation** of the classic painting received mixed reviews.

malevolent

adj. having or showing a desire to cause harm or evil to others

synonym: evil, malicious, wicked

(1) malevolent stars, (2) malevolent act

She had a **malevolent** intention to harm her enemy.

deceive

- v. to cause someone to believe something that is not true, often by telling a lie or creating a false impressionsynonym: mislead, dupe, hoodwink
- (1) deceive to lie, (2) deceive skillfully

The magician's illusions were designed to **deceive** the audience into believing they saw something impossible.
