maneuver

 a motion or combination of moves that requires skill and care; a clever strategy, activity, or movement intended to give someone an advantage

synonym: gimmick, trick, action

(1) political **maneuvers**, (2) made a great **maneuver** In this class, we learn the basic **maneuver** of the plane.

indifferent

adj. having no strong feelings or preferences one way or the other, neutral

synonym: apathetic, disinterested, unmoved

(1) an **indifferent** glance, (2) emotionally **indifferent** Despite the good news, she remained **indifferent** to the situation.

unfold

 to open up or spread out something that is folded or rolled up; to reveal or disclose something that was previously hidden or unknown

synonym: open, spread out, expose

(1) **unfold** the story, (2) **unfold** the stroller The mystery **unfolded** as the detectives gathered more clues.

stepwise

- adj. happening or proceeding in a series of regular stages rather than continuously
- (1) a **stepwise** shape, (2) recommend a **stepwise** approach This module generates a **stepwise** controlled voltage.

hyperventilation

n. a condition in which a person breathes very quickly and deeply, causing an increase in oxygen and a decrease in carbon dioxide levels in the blood, which can lead to symptoms such as dizziness, tingling, and fainting

synonym: over-breathing, rapid breathing

(1) **hyperventilation** syndrome, (2) **hyperventilation** treatment

Anxiety is a common cause of **hyperventilation**, as the body responds to perceived threats with rapid, shallow breathing.

whack

- v. to hit someone or something hard or noisily synonym: hit, strike, bash
- (1) **whack** him with a stick, (2) **whack** up the volume He **whacked** the ball out of the park with his home run.

unhelpful

- adj. not providing assistance or support; not contributing to the solution of a problem or the achievement of a goalsynonym: useless, ineffective, detrimental
- (1) **unhelpful** comments, (2) **unhelpful** for people His **unhelpful** attitude made it difficult for the team to complete the project on time.

catastrophic

adj. extremely harmful; causing physical or financial destruction

synonym: fatal, disastrous, destructive

(1) victim of **catastrophic** injuries, (2) **catastrophic** climate change

The extinction rate of aquatic animals was catastrophic.

overestimate

v. to estimate something to be greater in amount or importance than it really is

synonym: overrate, overvalue, embellish

(1) **overestimate** the value, (2) **overestimate** the amount of time spent

He tends to **overestimate** his abilities.

underestimate

v. to think or suppose that a quantity, price, or size is smaller than it is

synonym: underrate, misjudge, miscalculate

(1) **underestimate** an enemy, (2) **underestimate** the probability

They frequently **underestimated** their abilities and felt inferior.

woo

v. to seek the affection or favor of someone; to court or pursue someone romantically or with flattery

synonym: court, pursue, charm

(1) **woo** consumers, (2) **woo** voters with promises He tried to **woo** her with his charm and wit.

parasympathetic

adj. relating to the part of the autonomic nervous system that counteracts the effects of the sympathetic nervous system, slowing the heart rate, increasing digestive and glandular activity, and relaxing the sphincter muscles

synonym: relaxing, calming, soothing

(1) parasympathetic nerve inhibitor, (2) parasympathetic response

The **parasympathetic** nervous system helps to regulate the body's involuntary functions, such as digestion and relaxation.

overdrive

a gear in a vehicle that allows the engine to operate at a higher speed than the vehicle's speed, resulting in greater fuel efficiency and smoother driving; (verb) to drive or work too hard

synonym: high gear, high speed, turbocharge

- (1) atrial **overdrive** pacing, (2) go into **overdrive** The car's **overdrive** function allows it to shift into a higher gear for better fuel efficiency on the highway.
- a measure of the rate at which an engine or motor n. rotates, often expressed in revolutions per minute (RPM); (verb) to increase the number of rotations per minute

synonym: revolution, RPM, speed

provoke

rev

creditor

- n. a person, company, etc. to whom a debtor owes money
- the creditor's claims, (2) bankrupt creditor
 asked the lawyer to initiate creditor negotiations for voluntary liquidation.

helpless

adj. unable to take care of oneself or to do things without help

synonym: defenseless, powerless, susceptible

(1) **helpless** baby, (2) **helpless** victims I feel so **helpless** without you.

skeptical

adj. doubting that something is accurate or useful *synonym*: doubtful, distrustful, suspicious

a skeptical attitude, (2) skeptical scientists
 His religious and philosophical beliefs were utterly skeptical.

snobbery

the behavior or attitude of a person who believes they are superior to others because of their social status, wealth, or education and who looks down on those they consider inferior

synonym: elitism, arrogance, haughtiness

(1) cultural **snobbery**, (2) academic **snobbery**Her **snobbery** and pretentious behavior made it difficult for her to make friends.

exhale

v. to breathe out air or vapor from the lungs or mouth; to release or emit something slowly or gently

synonym: breathe out, expel, emit

(1) **exhale** a big sigh, (2) **exhale** cigarette smoke He took a deep breath and slowly began to **exhale**.

embarrass

- v. to cause someone to feel awkward, worried, or ashamed synonym: disconcert, unsettle, agitate
- (1) **embarrass** political enemy, (2) **embarrass** my project He looked for an opportunity to **embarrass** that actor in public.

dissipate

v. to disperse or scatter widely

synonym: scatter, disperse, evaporate

(1) dissipate heat, (2) dissipate stress

The fog **dissipated**, and the air cleared up.

pathological

adj. relating to or caused by a physical or mental disease or disorder; extreme or abnormal in a way that is harmful or unhealthy

synonym: aberrant, diseased, abnormal

(1) pathological liar, (2) pathological condition

The doctor was concerned that the patient's **pathological** fear of germs impacted their daily life.

reassure

v. to cause someone to feel sure; to give or restore confidence

synonym: comfort, soothe, bolster

(1) **reassure** anxious patients, (2) **reassure** market The pilot tried to **reassure** the customers that the planes were safe.

uneasy

adj. causing or feeling anxiety or discomfort

synonym: anxious, troubled, nervous

reframe

v. to reinterpret, rephrase, or redefine an issue, situation, or question in a different way

synonym: redefine, restructure, reposition

tactic

 a method or strategy used to achieve a particular goal or objective

synonym: strategy, approach, method

(1) an imprudent tactic, (2) alternative tactic

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The coach implemented a new **tactic** to win the game.

frightening

adj. causing fear or alarm, or very surprising and alarming synonym: scary, terrifying, alarming

(1) cast **frightening** eyes, (2) **frightening** experience The news of the pandemic was a **frightening** reminder of the fragility of human health.

instinct

 an inborn behavioral pattern that is often responsive to specific stimuli; an innate feeling that causes you to act or believe that something is true

synonym: intuition, aptitude, feeling

(1) **instinct** for self-preservation, (2) aggressive **instinct** When faced with a dangerous situation, his initial **instinct** was to flee.

compel

v. to force or require someone to do something; to exert a strong, irresistible force or pressure that makes someone act in a certain way

synonym: force, oblige, coerce

entrench

pandemic

 an outbreak of a disease that affects many people over a very wide area

synonym: outbreak

 ν . to be relevant or applicable to a particular subject or situation; to belong to or be connected with something

synonym: relate, concern, apply
