synonym: charge, indictment, imputation

grisly

adj. causing horror or disgust because of being connected with death or injury or having a raw or savage quality

synonym: gruesome, horrific, ghastly

(1) grisly death, (2) grisly details

The grisly scene of the crime horrified the witnesses.

fingerprint

 a unique pattern of ridges and valleys on the surface of a finger that can be used to identify a person

synonym: print, mark, impression

(1) **fingerprint** at a crime scene, (2) **fingerprint** identification

The police used a **fingerprint** scanner to identify the suspect.

determinant

 a factor, circumstance, or condition that contributes to the shaping, influencing, or determining of a particular

outcome or result

synonym: cause, factor, element

(1) environmental **determinant**, (2) a **determinant** of crop yields

One **determinant** of success is having a positive attitude and a strong work ethic.

evidentialism

 a philosophical theory that emphasizes the importance of evidence in forming beliefs and holds that beliefs are justified only if they are based on sufficient evidence

synonym: evidentiality, empiricism, rationalism

(1) **evidentialism** theory, (2) **evidentialism** principle
The primary goal of **evidentialism** is to promote rationality
and critical thinking.

accuse

v. to charge or criticize someone with a crime or wrongdoing

synonym: charge, blame, criticize

(1) **accuse** his rudeness, (2) **accuse** each other The witness **accused** the defendant of committing the robbery.

dishonest

adj. capable of being corrupted, not honest synonym: fraudulent, deceitful, untrustworthy

(1) **dishonest** politicians, (2) promote **dishonest** behavior Often in drama, **dishonest** personalities gain popularity.

moreover

adv. indicating that what follows is an additional or supplementary point; furthermore; in addition to what has been said before

synonym: furthermore, besides, in addition

(1) **moreover**, she decided to go, (2) but **moreover**, they work well together

The company is environmentally conscious, and **moreover**, it uses sustainable materials in its products.

pretension

 n. the act of claiming or asserting something, especially without good reason or without evidence; an unfounded or excessive claim or ambition

synonym: presumption, pretense, affectation

(1) **pretension** to authority, (2) baseless **pretension**His **pretensions** of being a gourmet were quickly exposed when he could not identify basic herbs and spices.

pragmatist

 a person who practically approaches situations and problems; someone who prioritizes usefulness and functionality over abstract principles or ideals

synonym: realist, practical person, utilitarian

(1) **pragmatist** perspective, (2) a true **pragmatist**As a **pragmatist**, she always focuses on finding practical solutions to problems.
