#### widow

a woman whose spouse has died and who has not remarried

#### struggle

#### accuse

to charge or criticize someone with a crime or wrongdoing

#### skip

## promiscuous

 adj. having casual sexual relations frequently with different partners; indiscriminate in the choice of sexual partners; not selective of a single class or person

## responsible

adj. answerable or accountable for something within one's power, control, or management

synonym: accountable, answerable, liable

She's a **responsible** pet owner who ensures her dog gets enough exercise and a healthy diet.

## juvenile

adj. relating to or characteristic of youth or young people; immature

synonym: youthful, boyish, childlike

The detective suspected that the vandalism was the work of **juvenile** delinquents.

## delinquent

 a person who regularly engages in minor criminal or antisocial activities, especially a young person; a person who has failed to neglect one's duty

#### committed

#### administer

#### verdict

an official opinion or decision made in a civil or criminal case or an inquest (= an inquiry into the cause of an unexpected death); the findings of a jury on issues of fact submitted to it for decision

synonym: judgment, ruling, decree

the popular verdict, (2) jury verdict
 The Court of Appeals upheld the verdict.

sterilize

 to make something free of all forms of life, especially bacteria or viruses, by using heat, chemicals, or radiation

synonym: disinfect, sanitize, cleanse

The nurse **sterilized** the instruments before the surgery to prevent any infections.

## deficiency

*n.* the state of lack, or not having enough of, something that is essential

#### horrific

## largely

 a factor, circumstance, or condition that contributes to the shaping, influencing, or determining of a particular outcome or result

*synonym*: cause, factor, element

## prejudice

 a thought or feeling that is unfair and makes no sense, mainly when it is formed without enough thought or knowledge

synonym: bias, preconception, predisposition

#### unfit

adj. not suitable or good enough for a particular purpose or standard

## immigrant

## disability

- a physical or mental condition that makes it difficult for someone to do some things that other people do

#### genetic

- adj. of or relating to genes (= parts of the DNA in cells) or the science of genes

#### descent

- n. the act or process of moving downward; a person's family origins

### influence

#### restricted

adj. limited in extent, number, scope, or action, especially by official rules, laws, etc.

## immigration

 the act or process of coming to live permanently in a foreign country

synonym: migration, settlement, emigration

(1) **immigration** control, (2) **immigration** application The **immigration** policy in this country is stringent, making it difficult for many people to obtain a visa.

#### outlaw

 to make something illegal; (noun) a person who has committed a crime or has been legally convicted of a crime

*synonym*: ban, prohibit, (noun) bandit

Some communities began to **outlaw** alcohol consumption.

#### racial

 adj. of or related to the race (= classification of humans into groups based on physical traits or social relations)

#### union

## hygiene

 the practice of maintaining cleanliness in the home and person to prevent illness

## policy

## globe

the earth or world, mainly used to emphasize its vastness

- v. to make a law; to put something into practice synonym: legislate, pass, decree

## government

 the group of people with authority to control a country or state

synonym: administration, regime, state

(1) **government** bureaucracy, (2) **government** funding The federal **government** is planning to increase taxes for the next fiscal year.

## forcibly

adv. done by physical power or violence; against someone's will

synonym: violently, roughly, aggressively

## typical

adj. having the usual characteristics or traits of a specific group of things

synonym: characteristic, usual, distinctive

## superficial

adj. existing or occurring only at or on the surface; appearing to be true or real only until examined more closelysynonym: shallow, facile, cursory

(1) **superficial** wound, (2) **superficial** knowledge
The journalist's **superficial** reporting should have captured the full scope of the issue.

## diagnose

v. to determine or distinguish the nature of a problem or an illness through a careful analysis

synonym: identify, analyze, interpret

## linguist

- n. a person who speaks several foreign languages; a person who studies or teaches languages or linguisticssynonym: grammatist, philologue, polyglot

cult

 a small religious group, especially one that is not part of a larger religion and that is regarded as outside the norm; followers of an exclusive system of beliefs and practices

synonym: sect, faith, religion

(1) cult members, (2) cult's practices

The **cult** leader promised his followers that they would achieve enlightenment if they followed his teachings.

#### bias

 a strong feeling in favor of or against one group of people, an idea, or thing, often not based on fair judgment

synonym: inclination, partiality, predilection

(1) **bias** against a big company, (2) have a **bias** toward socialism

She researched gender bias in politics.

#### racist

adj. characterized by or showing discrimination or prejudice against people of other races; (noun) a person with a prejudiced belief that one racial group is superior to others

synonym: discriminatory, prejudiced, bigoted

(1) far-right racist, (2) racist attitudes

The **racist** comments made by the politician caused widespread condemnation.

## problematic

*adj.* full of difficulties; difficult to deal with or solve *synonym*: inappropriate, inconvenient, worrisome

(1) a **problematic** situation, (2) seems to be highly **problematic** 

Direct democracy is effective in quickly resolving **problematic** situations within a community.

## incredibly

adv. in a way that is very difficult to believe; exceedingly or extremely

synonym: enormously, exceptionally, extraordinarily

(1) **incredibly** cheerful character, (2) get **incredibly** insecure

Several cities are experiencing **incredibly** high unemployment rates.

#### operate

- v. to work in a particular way; to supervise something synonym: work, use, employ
- (1) **operate** 24 hours a day, (2) manually **operate** a machine

This machine is too difficult to **operate** for me.

#### fame

 the condition of being well-known and discussed by a large number of people as a result of one's accomplishments, abilities, and so on

synonym: celebrity, renown, stardom

(1) leap into **fame**, (2) his undying **fame** Good **fame** is better than a good face.

## argue

 to express differing opinions or points of view, often in a heated or contentious manner; to present a case or reasoning to persuade or convince others

synonym: debate, dispute, quarrel

(1) argue a case, (2) argue passionately

The couple began to **argue** over which restaurant to go to for dinner.

#### viol

- a stringed instrument, typically with six strings and frets, played with a bow, also called a viola da gamba
- synonym: viola, viola da gamba, string instrument
- (1) viol instrument, (2) viol music

The viol player was rehearsing for an upcoming concert.

#### constitution

 n. the set of fundamental principles or established precedents that a state, a country, or an organization is governed by; the act of forming or establishing something

synonym: fundamental law, establishment, formation

(1) the national **constitution**, (2) the national **constitution** When the **constitution** is amended, it often creates a great deal of controversy throughout the country

### deprive

- v. to take away something from someone synonym: deny, take away, divest
- (1) **deprive** others of profit, (2) **deprive** him of his status He was **deprived** of his freedom when sentenced to life in prison.

## judge

 a person who makes decisions in a court of law; (verb) to determine the result of or form a critical opinion of something

synonym: arbiter, justice, (verb) deduce

#### oversee

v. to watch and direct someone or something to make sure that it is being done correctly

synonym: manage, command, supervise

#### spare

adj. additional to what is necessary for ordinary use; (verb) to give time, money, space, etc. to someone

synonym: extra, excess, (verb) afford

(1) spare parts, (2) spare cost

I made plans to spend my **spare** time beneficially.

## impending

adj. about to happen or occur; close in time; imminent synonym: imminent, upcoming, approaching

(1) impending doom, (2) impending crisis

We must prepare for the **impending** storm expected to hit our area.

## surgery

medical treatment of injuries or diseases involving an incision with instruments and often removing or replacing some parts of the body; the branch of medical science that treats disease or injury by operative procedures

*synonym*: operation, (medical) procedure

(1) cardiac **surgery**, (2) the professor of **surgery** He had undergone heart **surgery** years before.

victim

 a person who has been harmed, injured, or otherwise negatively affected by a particular action, circumstance, or event

synonym:

prey, target, sufferer

(1) **victim** support, (2) **victim** compensation

The **victim** of the crime deserves justice and support to recover from the trauma.

## acquire

v. to buy or obtain something such as an asset, object, knowledge, etc., for oneself

synonym: attain, earn, catch

(1) **acquire** knowledge, (2) **acquire** a new company Children **acquire** language at a fantastic rate.

## negative

adj. having the quality of something bad or harmful; expressing refusal

synonym: minus, adverse, pessimistic

(1) have a **negative** effect, (2) a **negative** number The movie has received almost universally **negative** criticism.

#### connote

 to suggest or imply something in addition to its literal or primary meaning; to imply something beyond the literal or primary meaning

synonym: imply, suggest, signify

(1) **connote** emotion, (2) **connote** symbolism

The word 'home' **connotes** a sense of warmth and comfort.

#### horror

 intense fear or disgust, especially at something shocking or terrifying

synonym: fear, terror, dread

(1) horror movie, (2) horror-struck look

The stories of war crimes filled her with **horror**.

#### nuanced

adj. characterized by subtle differences in appearance, meaning, sound, etc.

synonym: fine, subtle, slight

(1) **nuanced** view, (2) the common but **nuanced** opinion The sommelier can distinguish **nuanced** variance in the

#### bioethics

n. the study of ethical issues related to life sciences and healthcare, particularly those related to the moral implications of scientific advances in medicine and biology

*synonym*: medical ethics, bio-morality

(1) bioethics committee, (2) bioethics research

Using animals in medical research raises complex questions about **bioethics** and animal welfare.

#### blunt

adj. having a dull or rounded edge or point; not sharp;
 straightforward in speech or manner, often to the point of being rude or insensitive

synonym: dull, obtuse, insensitive

## pursue

 to do something or attempt to attain something over time; to follow or seek someone or something, especially in trying to catch them

## involuntary

adj. acting or done without or against one's will synonym: coerced, forced, automatic

n. a thin flat part on the body of a fish or other aquatic animal used for propulsion or balance

 a legal action taken by one party against another in a court of law, typically seeking damages or some other form of remedy for perceived wrongs or harms suffered

## protest
