opportune

adj. relating to, involving, or affecting different generations

The results of that survey clearly show **intergenerational** differences in attitudes toward LGBTQ.

incarceration

subordinate

industrious

adj. hardworking, diligent, and persistent in effort synonym: diligent, hardworking, assiduous

stratosphere

 the second layer of the Earth's atmosphere, extending from about 7 to 50 kilometers above the Earth's surface, containing the ozone layer

synonym: upper atmosphere, ozone layer

slew
