stick

expense

the money, time, or effort incurred or required for something

synonym: cost, expenditure, outlay

unique

adj. being the only one of its kind; unlike anything else *synonym*: one-of-a-kind, unparalleled, incomparable

confront

v. to face, meet or deal with a problem or difficult situation or person

synonym: engage, encounter, contend

threaten

 to utter intentions of injury or punishment against someone

synonym: endanger, terrorize, intimidate

(1) **threaten** a healthy relationship, (2) **threaten** national security

Various artificially induced causes are **threatening** our ecosystem.

vague

adj. not clearly expressed or understoodsynonym: ambiguous, imprecise, dim

(1) **vague** idea, (2) make a **vague** answer The **vague** rumor turned out to be false.

complain

 to say dissatisfaction or annoyance about something or somebody

synonym: gripe, claim, denounce

(1) **complain** about a job, (2) call and **complain** frequently Our users are often **complaining** about the slow application.

illegal

adj. not allowed by law

synonym: banned, prohibited, illicit

(1) **illegal** drugs, (2) child of **illegal** immigrants. The customs agents seized the **illegal** shipment.

retaliation

 n. the act of seeking vengeance or revenge in response to a perceived wrong or harm suffered, usually to cause harm to the person or group responsible for the initial act
 synonym: retribution, revenge, vengeance

regardless

adv. not paying attention or considering something or someone even if the situation is bad or there are difficulties

perverse

 adj. showing a deliberate and stubborn desire to go against what is expected or desired; contrary; willfully disobedient or immoral

His **perverse** sense of humor made many people uncomfortable.

incentive

- *n.* something, such as a punishment, reward, etc., that encourages a person to do something
- synonym: encouragement, inducement, enticement

enforcement

n. the act of ensuring that rules, regulations, or laws are obeyed or implemented; the act of applying force or pressure to compel compliance with rules or laws

steep

adj. having a sharp inclination or slopesynonym: sheer, precipitous, abrupt

(1) a **steep** staircase, (2) **steep** discount The **steep** cliff made it difficult to climb.

opportune

adj. suitable or happening at a time that is suitable or convenient for a particular purpose

synonym: suitable, timely, practical

chase

v. to pursue something or someone to catch or capture them; to go after something vigorously or with determination; (noun) a pursuit or a hunt; a narrow groove or channel cut into a surface, often used for decorative purposes

upgrade


