laborer

 a person who works hard physically, typically doing unskilled or manual labor; a worker or employee who performs physically demanding tasks

synonym: worker, employee, operative

The construction site hired many **laborers** to help with the heavy lifting.

screech

v. to make a loud, high-pitched, piercing sound, often indicating pain or fear

synonym: shriek, scream, yelp

(1) **screech** out a slogan, (2) **screech** with laughter The brakes on the car began to **screech** as the driver suddenly stopped at the intersection.

yell

v. to shout in a sudden and loud way

synonym: shout, scream, cry

(1) yell for help, (2) yell as loud as we can

relent

 to soften or become less severe, particularly in response to pressure or persuasion; to abandon a harsh or demanding attitude or stance

synonym: yield, soften, give in

(1) **relent** to pressure, (2) don't **relent** until late in the evening

The team refused to **relent** even after falling three points behind.

retaliation

 n. the act of seeking vengeance or revenge in response to a perceived wrong or harm suffered, usually to cause harm to the person or group responsible for the initial act
 synonym: retribution, revenge, vengeance

(1) **retaliation** tactics, (2) **retaliation** against discrimination The company faced heavy **retaliation** from its competitors after releasing a controversial product.

perverse

 adj. showing a deliberate and stubborn desire to go against what is expected or desired; contrary; willfully disobedient or immoral

synonym: stubborn, contrary, wicked

(1) **perverse** idea, (2) **perverse** attitude His **perverse** sense of humor made many people uncomfortable.

underresourced

 adj. lacking sufficient resources, especially financial or material support, to carry out a particular task, project, or mission

synonym: underfunded, deprived, resource-poor

The **underresourced** school needed help to provide basic supplies for its students.

opportune

adj. suitable or happening at a time that is suitable or convenient for a particular purpose

synonym: suitable, timely, practical

(1) **opportune** occasion, (2) an **opportune** remark The phone rang at the most **opportune** time.

undercut

- v. to sell goods or services at a lower price than a competitor; to cut away the underpart of somethingsynonym: undermine, weaken, sabotage

blacklist

 a list of names or entities that are seen as undesirables or perceived as a threat, often compiled by a government or organization and used to restrict access or opportunities

synonym: ban, exclusion, proscription

The software uses a robust **blacklist** to prevent access to malicious websites and protect users from online threats.

intern

v. to put someone in prison, especially for political or military reasons; (noun) a student or trainee who works, sometimes for free, to get work experience or to fulfill qualification criteria

The navy **interned** ships of defeated nations.

resurgence

 the return or growth of something after a period of decline or disappearance

synonym: revival, recovery, rejuvenation

insecure
