v. to surround or cover something completely; to include a large number of or different types of things entirely

synonym: surround, encircle, include

(1) **encompass** a broad range, (2) **encompass** the enemy The optimal solution that would **encompass** all these elements has yet to be proposed.

inferno

 a place or condition of intense suffering, especially Hell, in traditional Christian beliefs

synonym: hell, fiery pit, furnace

(1) a raging **inferno**, (2) devastating **inferno**The building was consumed by an **inferno**, reducing it to ashes.

churning

n. the process of mixing or stirring something vigorously, often to create a frothy or creamy texture; a state of upheaval or turbulence, often referring to the stock market or economy

synonym: agitation, turmoil, commotion

The **churning** of the waves on the beach made it difficult to swim.

humming

adj. producing a continuous, low, vibrating sound like that of the bee

synonym: buzzing, droning, vibrating

(1) **humming** sound, (2) **humming** bird

The **humming** of the bees filled the air as she walked through the garden.

dissipated

adj. dispersed or scattered in different directions; wasted or squandered on excessive or extravagant pleasures such as drinking, partying, or gambling; characterized by a lack of focus or discipline

synonym: debauched, dissolute, decadent

(1) dissipated lifestyle, (2) dissipated energy

His **dissipated** behavior at the party concerned his friends, who wondered if he had a substance abuse problem.

astronomer

n. a physicist who studies astronomy

synonym: stargazer, cosmologist, astrophysicist

(1) amateur astronomer, (2) solar astronomer

This question has fascinated solar **astronomers** for decades.

leftover

adj. not consumed or used at the end of something

synonym: extra, residual, unused

(1) **leftover** from a party, (2) **leftover** goods

The chef will make soup with the **leftover** ham bone.

primordial

adj. existing from the beginning of time or the start of a particular process; relating to the earliest stage of the universe

synonym: ancient, original, primary

(1) primordial forms of life, (2) primordial gas

The discovery of the **primordial** soup was a crucial step in understanding the origins of life on Earth.

observable

adj. that can be noticed or seen

synonym: visible, perceptible, detectable

(1) **observable** change, (2) experimentally **observable**

Any theorem relies on both observable fact and assumption.

conflagration

 a large, destructive fire that spreads quickly and can cause extensive damage; a great and wide-ranging conflict or war

synonym: blaze, holocaust, firestorm

(1) **conflagration** aftermath, (2) urban **conflagration**The **conflagration** in the forest destroyed many homes and caused much damage.

agonize

 to spend a long time thinking about a difficult problem and trying to make a decision, especially through worrying

synonym: disturb, excruciate, lament

(1) agonize pain, (2) agonize about financing

He **agonized** over whether to accept the job offer.

languish

v. (of a person, animal, or plant) to lose vigor, health, or flesh; to be forced to exist in an unpleasant or unwanted situation or place, often for a long time

synonym: flag, wane, wither

(1) **languish** for lack of funding, (2) **languish** under illness He continues to **languish** in prison.

smolder

 to burn slowly and without a flame, often with the production of smoke and heat; to exist or persist in a suppressed or hidden state, particularly anger or resentment

synonym: burn, smoke, simmer

(1) **smolder** in resentment for many years, (2) **smolder** beneath the surface

The fire continued to **smolder** long after the firefighters had left.

evaporate

v. to turn a liquid into a gas; to become less intense and disappear gradually

synonym: vaporize, disappear, vanish

(1) **evaporate** the water, (2) **evaporate** almost overnight The sun will **evaporate** the mist.

cosmology

the scientific study of the nature and origin of the universe

synonym: cosmogony

physical cosmology, (2) modern cosmology
 Cosmology evolved from people's philosophical questions about the natural world.

blip

- a sudden and small, and typically temporary, change or deviation from a general trend
- (1) temporary **blip**, (2) minor **blip**

The stock market had one bad blip today.

multiverse

- a hypothetical space or realm consisting of multiple universes, of which our universe is just one of them
- (1) the **multiverse** hypothesis, (2) the concept of the **multiverse**

The various universes within the **multiverse** are sometimes called parallel universes.

insignificant

adj. of little importance, influence, or power synonym: unimportant, trivial, irrelevant
