Christ

synonym: Savior, Jesus Christ, Jesus

arresting

synonym: striking, impressive, captivating

constable

heretic

- synonym: dissenter, nonconformist, dissident
- (1) heretic beliefs, (2) labeled a heretic

The philosopher was accused of being a **heretic** for his controversial ideas.

accusation

 a statement or claim alleging that someone has committed a crime, offense, or wrongdoing; a charge or indictment made against someone

synonym: charge, indictment, imputation

The **accusation** of theft was unfounded, and the suspect was eventually cleared of all charges.

confessor

mundane

Morisco

 a Muslim who was forced to convert to Christianity in Spain during the 16th and 17th centuries, or a descendant of such a person

synonym: Moorish, Muslim, arabized

The **Morisco** rebellion in the 1560s attempted to resist forced conversion to Catholicism.

procession

 a group of people or vehicles moving in an orderly, ceremonial manner, often for a religious or official purpose

The funeral **procession** slowly made its way to the cemetery.

sermon

exile

Sanbenito

 a garment, usually a sleeveless tunic, worn as a symbol of public humiliation or penance, particularly during the Spanish Inquisition

synonym: penalized garment, humiliating garment, shame garment

euphemism
