quitter

 a person who gives up easily or does not have the determination to finish what they have started

synonym: coward, deserter, surrender

oppress

v. to treat people in a cruel and authoritarian way, especially by denying them the same freedoms, rights, etc. as other people

synonym: antagonize, distress, burden

cardinal
