whomp

v. to strike or hit something with a heavy or resounding impact, often causing a loud noise or vibration

*synonym*: bump, thud, smack

(1) whomp opponent with an uppercut, (2) whomp down on

the table

The basketball player **whomped** the ball into the hoop, scoring the winning point for his team.

#### prosecute

v. to bring legal action against someone in a court of law; to pursue or carry out something to completion or achievement

synonym: charge, sue, bring to trial

(1) prosecute criminal, (2) prosecute case

The attorney decided to **prosecute** the suspect for stealing from the store.

#### handcuff

n. a pair of metal restraints that are designed to lock around a person's wrists and prevent them from moving their hands freely; (verb) to restrain or restrict the movement of a person by applying handcuffs, typically as part of an arrest or other security-related process

synonym: shackle, bind, restraint

(1) **handcuff** his wrists, (2) break free from **handcuffs** The police officer put **handcuffs** on the suspect before placing them in the squad car.

### bureaucracy

 a system of government in which most of the important decisions are made by state officials rather than by elected representatives

synonym: administration, government, system

(1) government **bureaucracy**, (2) arbitrary **bureaucracy**The bumbling **bureaucracy** made it difficult to get the permits we needed.

bum

 a person who is homeless or lives in poverty; a lazy, shiftless, or worthless person; a beggar; a person who spends time doing nothing productive

synonym: hobo, vagrant, tramp

(1) homeless bum, (2) lazy bum

He used to be a successful businessman, but now he's a washed-up **bum** with nothing to show.

### discotheque

 a nightclub or restaurant where recorded music is played, and people dance

synonym: nightclub, dance club, disco

(1) **discotheque** party, (2) **discotheque** scene

He couldn't wait to hit the **discotheque** and dance the night away.

#### solvable

adj. capable of being solved or resolved; able to be fixed or resolved with effort, skill, or knowledgesynonym: attainable, resolvable, achievable

(1) **solvable** problem, (2) mathematically **solvable** equation The engineers found the technical glitch in the system was quite **solvable** with a software update.

### stigma

 a mark of shame or disgrace associated with a particular circumstance, quality, or person

synonym: mark, blemish, disgrace

(1) social **stigma**, (2) **stigma** against obesity

The mental health **stigma** often prevents people from seeking treatment.

#### sham

 something that is not as good or true as it seems to be and is intended to deceive people; a person who pretends to be something they are not

synonym: bogus, counterfeit, fraudulent

(1) a **sham** battle, (2) turn out to be all **sham** The data he prepared was completely **sham**.

#### expunge

v. to erase, remove, or eliminate; to blot out or destroy; to strike out or delete from a record or registry

synonym: erase, delete, remove

(1) **expunge** a memory, (2) **expunge** a word from a text The court ordered to **expunge** the criminal record of the falsely accused individual.

#### fathom

 to understand or comprehend (a difficult or complex problem or situation); to measure the depth of water synonym: comprehend, understand, grasp

(1) **fathom** the depth, (2) **fathom** the mystery

I cannot **fathom** why some people enjoy horror movies.

#### audacious

 adj. showing a willingness to take bold risks or to do something that is considered unconventional or daring; marked by originality, creativity, or boldness

synonym: bold, daring, fearless

(1) audacious stunt, (2) audacious decision

The young entrepreneur had an **audacious** plan to start his own company.

### untapped

adj. not yet used or exploited

synonym: unexplored, untouched, untried

(1) untapped market, (2) untapped potential

The forest held many **untapped** resources that could be used for commercial purposes.
