statistics

slavery

 the practice or system of owning, buying, and selling people as property and forcing them to work

synonym: bondage, servitude, enslavement

asset

n. something or someone that is useful or valuable quality, skill, etc.; valuable property

synonym: aid, resource, equity

minus

adj. subtracting or taking away; having a value less than zero

synonym: without, lacking, negative

### inequity

n. a lack of fairness or justice; an unfair or unequal situation or practice

synonym: injustice, unfairness, bias

### corporate

#### consultant

#### conversation

### progression

#### institutionalize

### hedge

 a fence formed by a line of bushes or shrubs; (verb) limit or avoid something such as duties, issues, and questions by conditions or exceptions

#### descendant

intersect

 a place where a stone or other materials are extracted from the ground; an animal or a person that is the target of hunting

property

n. a thing or things that belong to someone

synonym: belongings, possessions, equity

#### labor

n. productive work, especially physical work done for wages; the people who do manual or physical work in a country or company for wage; (verb) to work hard or to strive and make an effort to reach a goal

synonym: toil, moil, donkeywork

In several countries, child **labor** is a serious social problem.

#### servant

 a person who performs duties for others, especially a person employed in a house on domestic duties or as a personal attendant

synonym: attendant, helper, assistant

The faithful **servant** had been working for the family for many years and was well-trusted.

#### confederate

 a person who is allied or associated with another person or group, especially in a political or military context; a supporter of the Confederate States of America

synonym: ally, associate, partner

#### enslave

v. to make someone a slave; to deprive someone of their freedom of choice or action

### opportune

 adj. suitable or happening at a time that is suitable or convenient for a particular purpose

synonym: suitable, timely, practical

#### settlement

an official agreement that brings an argument to a close;
 the process of establishing permanent residence in a place.

synonym: agreement, accommodation, colonization

Our goal must be to achieve a peaceful **settlement**.

#### advocate

 a person who supports or suggests an idea, development, or way of doing something

synonym: proponent, exponent, promoter

(1) an **advocate** of disarmament, (2) public education **advocates** 

**Advocates** of abolishing the death penalty often argue that the alternative heaviest sentence should be life in prison.

#### decide

- v. to make up someone's mind about something; to come to a conclusion or judgment after considering options
   synonym: choose, determine, settle
- (1) **decide** a question, (2) **decide** on a course of action She couldn't **decide** whether to order the pizza or the pasta for dinner.

### essentially

adv. relating to the essential features or concepts of anything synonym: fundamentally, basically, virtually

(1) **essentially** correct, (2) become **essentially** same **Essentially**, a society is an organism.

### sharecropper

 a farmer who cultivates a piece of land owned by someone else, usually in exchange for a share of the crops produced

synonym: tenant farmer, cropper, farmer

(1) **sharecropper** system, (2) **sharecropper** labor Many **sharecroppers** in the South were impoverished and trapped in a cycle of debt.

#### draft

 a preliminary version of something that is not yet in its final form

synonym: blueprint, outline, rough drawing

(1) a working draft, (2) write the first draft

During debates in the legislature, the **draft** of the law caused a lot of controversies.

### segregate

v. to separate or set apart from others, often based on race, gender, or some other characteristic

synonym: isolate, separate, divide

(1) **segregate** by race, (2) **segregate** boys and girls The school board decided to **segregate** students by the ability to meet their needs better.

### sentimental

adj. connected with or resulting from someone's emotions, rather than reason or realism

synonym: bathetic, drippy, maudlin

(1) in a **sentimental** mood, (2) **sentimental** damage Stop being **sentimental** and always speak the truth.

### economy

n. the system by which a country or region produces manages, and distributes goods and services, including the money and finances involved in these activities; (of an airline) the lowest-priced, most basic option for seating in commercial travel

synonym: finance, trade, business

(1) economy of scale, (2) economy class

The **economy** of the country is struggling due to the recent political instability.

### compress

v. to press or squeeze together to make something take up less space

synonym: condense, constrict, squeeze

(1) compress the chest, (2) compress gas

She **compressed** the files into a single ZIP archive to save space on her computer.

#### stressor

- n. something that causes stress or emotional tensionsynonym: pressure, strain, burden

### acquire

v. to buy or obtain something such as an asset, object, knowledge, etc., for oneself

synonym: attain, earn, catch

#### creditor

- n. a person, company, etc. to whom a debtor owes money
- the creditor's claims, (2) bankrupt creditor

#### veteran

 a person who has had long experience in a particular area or activity

synonym: expert, pro, vet

### mortgage

 a loan secured by the collateral of a specific property, such as a house, that is repaid over a set period of time with interest; the legal agreement governing this loan

synonym: home loan, loan, lien

(1) mortgage payment, (2) fixed-rate mortgage They were able to purchase their dream home with a mortgage from the bank.

### largely

- adv. virtually entirely; to a large degree synonym: mainly, chiefly, broadly

### highlight

v. to make something prominent, mainly so that people give it more attention

synonym: feature, emphasize, stress

#### fantastic

adj. extremely good; excellent

synonym: incredible, unbelievable, marvelous

(1) a **fantastic** dress, (2) absolutely **fantastic** event The new amusement park ride was **fantastic**, with twists, turns, and drops that left riders screaming with excitement.

### ownership

n. the state or fact of possessing, controlling, or having the right to something; the legal and moral right to use or dispose of something as one chooses

synonym: possession, title, proprietorship

(1) property **ownership**, (2) share **ownership**The company's **ownership** has changed hands several times in the past few years.

### equity

- n. the value of the shares issued by a companysynonym: fairness
- (1) private **equity** firm, (2) **equity** capital market That company is cautious when it comes to **equity** investment.

### skip

 to move along lightly and quickly, making a step from one foot to the other with a hop or bounce; to intentionally fail to do something which would normally do

synonym: bounce, spring, neglect

#### redline

 a boundary or threshold beyond which something is no longer acceptable or allowed; a mark or line drawn in red to indicate a specific limit or danger zone

The neighborhood was affected by a **redline** drawn by real estate agents to keep specific populations out.

#### discriminate

v. to treat a person or particular group of people worse or better than another, especially in an unfair way; to recognize or perceive the difference between people or things

#### communal

adj. belonging to or used by a group rather than individuals; for common use

#### crisis

 a time of great disagreement, confusion, or danger when problems must be resolved or critical decisions must be taken

*synonym*: concern, problem, emergency

(1) financial crisis, (2) crisis management

The Chinese word for **crisis** comprises two characters, one for danger and the other for opportunity.

### crush

v. to press it firmly, usually with your hands or a tool, so that it becomes flat or smaller

synonym: destroy, demolish, pulverize

(1) **crush** coffee beans, (2) **crush** a revolt

The car was completely **crushed** in the accident.

### subprime

- adj. of or relating to financial loans, particularly mortgages, which are made to individuals with poor credit histories or limited income, often associated with higher interest rates and a greater risk of default
- (1) **subprime** lending, (2) **subprime** market

  The **subprime** mortgage crisis of 2008 led to a global economic downturn.

### strip

v. to remove the surface from something; (noun) a sizeable narrow piece of something such as paper, metal, cloth, etc., or area of land, sea, etc.

The doctor advised him to **strip** down for a check.

#### critic

 someone who expresses opinions about the quality of books, music, etc.

synonym: pundit, analyst, attacker

(1) art critic, (2) severe critic

Advocates for legal reform hear less harsh words from their **critics**.

#### thrive

- v. to grow vigorously; to make steady progresssynonym: bloom, flourish, prosper
- (1) **thrive** in a society, (2) **thrive** on pressure Without investment, a business cannot **thrive**.

#### contribute

- v. to give something, especially money or goods, to provide or achieve something together with other people synonym: donate, devote, commit
- (1) **contribute** a large sum of money to the fund,
- (2) contribute to society

Government workers cannot **contribute** to political campaigns.

#### underbanked

adj. not having enough access or connection to mainstream banking services or financial institutions

synonym: underfunded, financially excluded, marginalized

(1) **underbanked** community, (2) **underbanked** customers The **underbanked** population is often forced to rely on alternative financial services such as payday loans and check cashing.

#### unbanked

- adj. not having a bank account or access to any financial services

#### alternative

- n. one of two or more available possibilities or choicesynonym: choice, option

### payday

n. the day on which an employee receives wages or a salary for work performed; a specific time period, usually two weeks or a month, during which wages or salaries are earned and paid out

synonym: salary, wages, remuneration

#### transaction

 an instance of buying or selling something; the act or process of doing something

synonym: trade, dealing, commerce

(1) card with no foreign **transaction** fees, (2) **transaction** balance

### perspective

a confident attitude toward something; a particular style of thinking about something

synonym: viewpoint, standpoint, outlook

- (1) a **perspective** view, (2) the **perspective** of the battle His father's death changed his whole **perspective** on life.
- n. a sum of money charged for a particular servicesynonym: charge, cost, expense
- (1) **fee** calculation, (2) service **fee**The lawyer's **fee** for the case was \$10,000.

#### commit

fee

- v. to do something illegal or wrong synonym: engage, carry out, execute
- commit suicide, (2) commit mistakes
   The military has committed an abuse of human rights.

### utility

 the state or quality of being useful or convenient; the service, such as electric power or water or transportation, provided by a public

synonym: usefulness, practicality, utility

(1) utility costs, (2) marginal utility

The **utility** of the device was immediately apparent to all who saw it.

#### advance

- v. to go or move forward; to develop in a positive way synonym: progress, boost, come along
- (1) **advance** the technology, (2) **advance** a cooperative relationship

Scientific knowledge will **advance** significantly with the power of AI.

#### automatic

 adj. able to work or operate with little or no direct human control; independent of external control

synonym: mechanical, robotic, intuitive

(1) **automatic** operation, (2) the **automatic** shrinking of the pupils

In passenger aircraft, it is common to use an **automatic** pilot during cruising.

### physically

- adv. in a way related to a person's body or appearance rather than their mind
- (1) **physically** and mentally, (2) stay **physically** fit Having a **physically** healthy physique is essential for a great life.

#### maintain

 to continue to uphold or sustain; to keep in a particular state or condition; to assert or declare something to be true

synonym: preserve, uphold, sustain

(1) **maintain** order, (2) **maintain** good health I need to **maintain** my car regularly to prevent any major mechanical issues.

### specifically

adv. only associated with or meant for one thingsynonym: especially, particularly, notably

(1) designed **specifically** for men, (2) for **specifically** American customers

This ad campaign is aimed **specifically** at young women.

#### awareness

the fact or state of knowing something exists and is important

synonym: understanding, cognition, knowledge

(1) **awareness** of my ignorance, (2) raise public **awareness** There has been a gradual but steady rise in environmental **awareness**.

#### invisible

*adj.* impossible or nearly impossible to see *synonym*: hidden, imperceptible, unseen

(1) an **invisible** asset, (2) **invisible** stars

The phenomenon is **invisible** at optical wavelengths.

### creditworthy

adj. of or relating to a person or entity that has a strong credit history and is therefore seen as likely to repay any loans or debts they may incur, typically associated with lower interest rates and more favorable loan terms

synonym: dependable, trustworthy

(1) **creditworthy** borrower, (2) **creditworthy** business The bank only lends money to **creditworthy** individuals with a proven financial responsibility track record.

#### assess

 to judge or decide the nature or quality of someone or something

synonym: estimate, evaluate, consider

(1) **assess** a tax of 10 pounds, (2) **assess** the quality Our company needs to **assess** the business impact of climate change.

#### consistent

*adj.* always behaving or happening in the same way, or having the same thoughts, standards, etc.

synonym: coherent, constant, compatible

(1) do on a **consistent** basis, (2) get **consistent** results You are not **consistent** in your behavior.

#### innovate

- v. to introduce new methods, ideas, or productssynonym: bring in, introduce, found
- (1) **innovate** a new method, (2) **innovate** the quality of his life

Companies developing self-driving cars consistently **innovate** the emerging technologies.

#### cable

 a set of wires covered by plastic or rubber that carries electricity, phone signals, etc.; a solid thick rope made of twisted hemp or steel wire

synonym: wire, cord, rope

(1) cable television, (2) coaxial cable

This system uses submarine **cables** to exchange information between continents.

#### addition

 the act or process of adding something to something else; the process of adding numbers

synonym: accumulation, expansion, addendum

(1) chemical addition, (2) addition of vectors

In addition, private corporations provide healthcare services.

### regulatory

adj. having the power to control or restrict something such as business or industry according to rules or principles

synonym: regulative, managerial

(1) **regulatory** cells, (2) compliance with **regulatory** requirements

In the past, Japanese banks were protected by **regulatory** control.

### regulator

 a person or thing that controls or balances something; a person or an organization that is responsible for control and supervision of a particular activity or area of public interest

synonym: controller, supervisor, monitor

The financial industry **regulator** was responsible for ensuring that companies followed the laws.

### margin

 the space around the edge of a page or document;
 (finance) the net sales minus the cost of goods and services sold

synonym: edge, border, periphery

(1) margin error, (2) a profit margin

Unfortunately, the book's **margin** was too small to make notes.

#### industrious

adj. hardworking, diligent, and persistent in effort synonym: diligent, hardworking, assiduous

(1) industrious worker, (2) industrious student

He was known to be very **industrious** and would often work late into the night.

#### innovation

 the creation of a new device or process resulting from study and experimentation

synonym: invention, initiation, creation

(1) innovation leader, (2) cutting-edge innovation

The vegetarian burger was an **innovation** that quickly spread to the United Kingdom.

#### sandbox

 an outdoor play area for children consisting of a box filled with sand; a virtual testing environment used for software development or security testing

synonym: playpen, sandpit, box

(1) sandbox approach, (2) virtual sandbox

The children played in the **sandbox** for hours, building sandcastles and digging tunnels.

### expand

v. to increase or to make something greater in size, number, or importance

*synonym*: extend, grow, boost

#### individual

- n. a single person or thing, as distinct from a group synonym: person, being, self
- (1) a private **individual**, (2) **individual** freedom

#### suffer

v. to experience pain, distress, or hardship; to undergo or endure something painful or unpleasant

### severely

adv. very badly or seriously

synonym: harshly, hardly, oppressively

#### boom

 a sudden increase in economic activity, or a sudden happening that brings good fortune; a deep, loud, and prolonged sound

*synonym*: roaring, prosperity, boost

(1) boom in sales, (2) a sonic boom

The high-technology industry is enjoying a **boom**.

#### partnership

*n.* the state of a cooperative relationship between people or groups, especially in business

*synonym*: alliance, participation, cooperation

The military **partnership** between the two countries created tension in the international community.

### philanthropy

*n.* the practice of voluntarily helping the poor, especially by giving money

synonym: altruism, benevolence, generosity

#### historic

*adj.* famous or significant in history, or potentially so *synonym*: memorable, momentous, historical

### stability

### employee
