synonym: covid

ironic

adj. using words to express something different from and often opposite to their literal or usual meaning, often for humorous or rhetorical effect

synonym: sarcastic, wry, sardonic

It was **ironic** that the heavy rain started just as they set up for an outdoor picnic.

disproportionately

adv. in a way that is not reasonably or appropriately balanced, equal, or distributed; in a manner that is unequal or excessive about something else

synonym: excessively, unequally

(1) **disproportionately** affected, (2) **disproportionately** high

The rich can often **disproportionately** benefit from tax breaks and other advantages.

staple

adj. essential, crucial, or regularly used synonym: essential, fundamental, pivotal

(1) staple commodities, (2) staple crop

Rice and beans are a **staple** food in many cultures.

innumerate

 adj. unable to perform simple numerical calculations; having little or no skill in mathematics

synonym: countless, untold, innumerous

(1) innumerate population, (2) innumerate thinking

The survey results were rendered meaningless by the **innumerate** analysis of the data.

quarantine

 a state of isolation imposed on people or animals to prevent the spread of disease

synonym: isolation, confinement, restriction

cholera

 a severe infectious disease that causes acute diarrhea, vomiting, and dehydration, often resulting in a rapid and dangerous loss of body fluids and electrolytes

synonym: infectious disease, epidemic, plague

pandemic

 an outbreak of a disease that affects many people over a very wide area

synonym: outbreak

lockdown

- an emergency policy for people, communities, or a country to stay where they are, usually due to specific risks, such as COVID-19

tardy

redouble
