#### associate

v. to mentally connect someone or something with someone or something else

synonym: tie in, link, consociate

(1) **associate** alcohol with gambling, (2) **associate** with people widely

The majority of consumers **associate** this brand with quality.

## cofounder

- one of several people who establishes an organization or starts a business
- (1) cofounder of the university, (2) late cofounderHe is the cofounder and chairman of this tech company.

#### spot

- a particular location or place; a small round or roundish area, differing in color or feels from the surface around it
   synonym: dot, mark, place
- beauty spot, (2) a spot on his honor
   This remote spot is rarely visited.

## tackle

- v. to try to deal with a complex problem or situation synonym: deal with, dive into, work on
- (1) tackle the issue, (2) help tackle climate change

The government is determined to **tackle** sharp inflation.

#### harassment

n. the act of repeatedly annoying, tormenting, or persecuting someone in a way that is threatening or unwelcome, often relating to issues of race, gender, or other identities

*synonym*: bullying, persecution, intimidation

(1) sexual **harassment**, (2) emotional **harassment**The company has a zero-tolerance policy for **harassment** in the workplace.

## discriminate

v. to treat a person or particular group of people worse or better than another, especially in an unfair way; to recognize or perceive the difference between people or things

*synonym*: show prejudice, segregate, differentiate

- (1) discriminate against women employees,
- (2) discriminate between different things

You should not discriminate against minorities.

# charity

 an organization that helps people in need, especially by providing food, shelter, or money; a kindly and sympathetic attitude toward people

synonym: philanthropy, benevolence, generosity

(1) charity work, (2) ask charity

She volunteers at a local **charity** every weekend to help those in need.

#### conduct

- v. to organize and carry out a particular activity synonym: behave, lead, carry on
- (1) **conduct** a background check, (2) **conduct** research Police will **conduct** random breath testing for drunk driving.

witness

a person who sees something happen, especially a crime or an accident

*synonym*: onlooker, attestant, bystander

(1) witness of the car accident, (2) a material witness

The manufacturing industry is witnessing fierce competition.

## victim

 a person who has been harmed, injured, or otherwise negatively affected by a particular action, circumstance, or event

synonym: prey, target, sufferer

(1) **victim** support, (2) **victim** compensation

The **victim** of the crime deserves justice and support to recover from the trauma.

# inappropriate

adj. not suitable or proper for a particular occasion, purpose, or person

synonym: improper, unsuitable, unacceptable

(1) **inappropriate** behavior, (2) **inappropriate** language It was highly **inappropriate** to make jokes during a serious business meeting.

## academic

- adj. associated with schools, colleges, and universities,especially studying and thinking, not with practical skillssynonym: educational, scholarly, theoretical
- (1) **academic** probation, (2) an **academic** discussion

  An excellent historian must possess an **academic** mentality.

#### relentless

adj. persistent and determined; continuing despite difficulties or setbacks

synonym: unyielding, tireless, unremitting

(1) **relentless** attack, (2) face **relentless** pressure The athlete's **relentless** training paid off in the end.

### overreact

v. to react more strongly or excessively than is necessary or appropriate

synonym: overplay, exaggerate, overstate

(1) **overreact** with anger, (2) **overreact** to the criticism She **overreacted** to the situation and caused unnecessary stress.

#### sane

adj. mentally sound or normal; having a rational mind synonym: rational, sound, normal

(1) for a sane reason, (2) sane judgment

Despite the difficult circumstances, he remained **sane**.

# paralysis

 a condition in which you are unable to move or lose control of part or most of the body because of illness or injury

*synonym*: immobility, stiffness, palsy

(1) moral **paralysis**, (2) **paralysis** in the leg Massive demonstrations lead to total **paralysis** of transportation.

# consequence

 the outcome of a particular action or event, especially relative to an individual

synonym: result, impact, outcome

(1) unintended **consequences**, (2) the **consequence** of an argument

These economic activities had disastrous environmental **consequences**.

### barrier

 a fence or other obstruction that makes it hard to move or get in; any condition that makes it difficult to make progress or to achieve an objective

synonym: border, barricade, fence

(1) cost barrier, (2) information barrier

The police placed a **barrier** across the street to halt traffic.

#### voiceless

adj. without a voice or the ability to speak synonym: mute, silent, speechless

(1) voiceless consonant, (2) voiceless minority

The **voiceless** screams of the victims could be heard in the distance.

#### submit

v. to give or offer a document, proposal, etc. to a decision-maker for examination or consideration

*synonym*: hand in, present, propose

(1) agree to **submit** the bill, (2) **submit** an application Please **submit** the assignment to me.

## shock

 a strong feeling or physical reaction to a sudden and unexpected event or experience, especially something unpleasant

synonym: amazement, surprise, stunner

(1) death from shock, (2) shock-resistantHe got an electric shock at work.

wit

 the ability to say or write things or ideas in a clever and humorous way

synonym: humor, comedy, funniness

(1) the wit of man, (2) full of wit

He has the wit to keep talking about this topic.

## mobilize

v. to make something ready for action or use; to organize people or resources for a particular purpose

synonym: activate, rally, marshal

(1) **mobilize** cooperation, (2) **mobilize** a stiff joint The military **mobilized** troops to the border.

# psychology

- n. the scientific study of mind and behavior
- (1) **psychology** experiment, (2) **psychology** of crowd She had a master's degree in **psychology**.

#### barista

a person who works in a coffee shop or café, typically making and serving coffee and other hot beverages

synonym: coffee maker, coffee expert, espresso artist

(1) barista skills, (2) professional barista

The **barista** at my favorite coffee shop always makes the perfect latte.

## deny

v. to state that one refuses to admit the existence or truth of something

synonym: refute, reject, repudiate

# (1) adamantly deny killing, (2) deny the allegationsHe is still denying stealing the money from the cash register.

#### washroom

- n. a room or public facility equipped for washing one's hands and face, often including a toilet or a showersynonym: restroom, lavatory, bathroom
- (1) washroom facility, (2) public washroomPlease make sure to clean the washroom before leaving.

# bystander

- n. a person who witnesses an event or situation but does not actively participate or intervene
   synonym: spectator, observer, witness
- (1) innocent **bystander**, (2) shocked **bystander**The **bystander** effect is a phenomenon where people are less likely to intervene in an emergency if others are present.

# handcuff

- a pair of metal restraints that are designed to lock around a person's wrists and prevent them from moving their hands freely; (verb) to restrain or restrict the movement of a person by applying handcuffs, typically as part of an arrest or other security-related process
- synonym: shackle, bind, restraint
- (1) **handcuff** his wrists, (2) break free from **handcuffs** The police officer put **handcuffs** on the suspect before placing them in the squad car.

## immediate

- adj. happening or done without delay or occurring shortly after something else
- synonym: prompt, quick, instantaneous
- (1) take **immediate** effect, (2) the **immediate** past Both forts were subject to **immediate** attacks.

# implement

- v. to put a decision, plan, or system into effect synonym: execute, enforce, put through
- (1) **implement** a corporate strategy, (2) **implement** security measures

The government promised to **implement** a new system to control the financial crisis.

#### bias

 a strong feeling in favor of or against one group of people, an idea, or thing, often not based on fair judgment

*synonym*: inclination, partiality, predilection

(1) **bias** against a big company, (2) have a **bias** toward socialism

She researched gender bias in politics.

#### hero

 a person who is admired or idealized for courage, outstanding achievements, or noble qualities; a character in literature or history who is central to the plot and who exhibits heroic qualities

synonym: champion, protagonist, savior

(1) local hero, (2) unsung hero

The soldier who sacrificed his life for his country is considered a national **hero**.

# hypothesis

 a proposed idea or explanation that is based on a few known facts but has not yet been proven to be true or accurate

*synonym*: assumption, conjecture, theory

(1) test my **hypothesis**, (2) a bold **hypothesis**. This evidence supports the big-bang **hypothesis**.

#### scenario

a description of possible actions or events in the future;
 a written outline of a play, film, or literary work

synonym: plan, scheme, procedure

(1) the worst case **scenario**, (2) number of different **scenarios** 

The president prepared several possible **scenarios** for an enemy attack.

#### intervene

to intentionally get involved in a situation to improve it or prevent it from getting worse

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synonym: interfere, mediate, intercede

(1) **intervene** in a dispute, (2) **intervene** between quarreling parties

Following international law, our country does not **intervene** in the internal affairs of our neighbors.

prey

the object of a hunt; an animal hunted or trapped for eating

synonym: target, quarry, chase

(1) **prey** of beast, (2) become **prey** to terrorists The majority of snakes swallow their **prey** whole.

quarter

- n. one of four equal parts; a fourth part or portionsynonym: fourth, one-fourth
- (1) a **quarter** mile, (2) end of the first **quarter**The unemployment rate in the first **quarter** was 2.3 percentage points higher than in the previous.

participate

v. to take part in something

synonym: take part, partake, enter

(1) **participate** fully in conversation, (2) **participate** in the program

The majority of students actively **participated** in the college's intramural sports program.

incident

*n.* an event or occurrence, often unexpected or unplanned; something that happens

synonym: event, occurrence, accident

(1) traffic incident, (2) security incident

The **incident** at the airport caused a delay in my flight.

cite

v. to refer to something such as a passage, book, etc. as evidence for a theory or as a reason why something has happened

synonym: quote, mention, note

(1) cite various authorities, (2) cite a fact as evidence

The devil can cite Scripture for his purpose.

### retaliation

- n. the act of seeking vengeance or revenge in response to a perceived wrong or harm suffered, usually to cause harm to the person or group responsible for the initial act
   synonym: retribution, revenge, vengeance
- (1) **retaliation** tactics, (2) **retaliation** against discrimination The company faced heavy **retaliation** from its competitors after releasing a controversial product.

## interfere

v. to get involved in and prevent a process or activity from continuing

synonym: interpose, interrupt, hamper

(1) **interfere** in another country's affairs, (2) **interfere** with DNA synthesis

Your talking interferes with my work.

#### snitch

 to inform on or betray someone, usually to authorities or figures of authority, especially for personal gain or advantage

synonym: inform, tattle, rat

(1) **snitch** and give valuable information, (2) **snitch** to the authorities

He **snitched** on his coworkers when he realized they were breaking the law.

#### committed

adj. willing to put in a lot of effort, time, and energy into something; firmly believing in something

synonym: devoted, faithful, attached

(1) in a **committed** relationship, (2) strong and **committed** sales staff

Our company is strongly **committed** to meeting customers' needs.

# counseling

 n. the process of providing guidance and support to someone, often in a therapeutic or professional context, to help them overcome personal or emotional difficulties and improve their mental health and well-being synonym: therapy, guidance, advice

(1) **counseling** about risk management, (2) career **counseling** 

I am going to **counseling** to work through my anxiety and depression.

# therapy

 the act of caring for someone through medication, remedial training, etc.

synonym: antidote, medicine, treatment

therapy for a patient, (2) field of gene therapy
 underwent aversion therapy for my addiction to alcohol.

# process

n. a series of actions or operations performed to achieve a particular outcome or goal; a systematic procedure or approach used to accomplish a specific task or objective; a method of treating milk to make it suitable for consumption or use in other dairy products

synonym: procedure, method, system

(1) **process** improvement, (2) decision-making **process**The **process** for applying for a visa can be lengthy and complicated.

# largely

adv. virtually entirely; to a large degree synonym: mainly, chiefly, broadly

(1) **largely** accepted, (2) **largely** mitigate the issue Nevada is **largely** a desert state.

#### invisible

adj. impossible or nearly impossible to seesynonym: hidden, imperceptible, unseen

an invisible asset, (2) invisible stars
 the phenomenon is invisible at optical wavelengths.

## intern

v. to put someone in prison, especially for political or military reasons; (noun) a student or trainee who works, sometimes for free, to get work experience or to fulfill qualification criteria

*synonym*: apprentice, trainee, student

(1) intern civilians, (2) medical intern

The navy **interned** ships of defeated nations.

# negative

adj. having the quality of something bad or harmful; expressing refusal

synonym: minus, adverse, pessimistic

(1) have a **negative** effect, (2) a **negative** number The movie has received almost universally **negative** criticism.

# repercussion

 an effect or consequence of something, especially an unwelcome one, of an event or action

synonym: impact, consequence, outcome

(1) the **repercussion** of an action, (2) cultural **repercussion** The decision had far-reaching **repercussions** and affected many people.

# qualitative

adj. relating to or involving qualities, such as properties, characteristics, or features, rather than quantities or numbers, often used to describe research or analysis that focuses on subjective or non-measurable factors

synonym: subjective, interpretative

(1) qualitative analysis, (2) qualitative factors

The researchers used a **qualitative** approach to analyze their findings.

# profoundly

adv. to a great or complete degree; deeply

synonym: deeply, greatly, completely

(1) profoundly insightful, (2) sleep profoundly

The novel affected her **profoundly**, causing her to question her beliefs and values.

# anxiety

 a feeling of worry, nervousness, or unease about something that is happening or might happen in the future

synonym: concern, dread, agita

(1) diagnosis of **anxiety** disorder, (2) **anxiety** for knowledge She waited for her daughter with **anxiety**.

# depression

 a mental condition in which a person feels very unhappy and without hope for the future; a severe recession in an economy or market

synonym: recession, slump, despair

(1) the Great **Depression**, (2) the root problem of her **depression** 

**Depression** symptoms might include a decrease in appetite and weight loss.

# prevalence

the state or condition of being widespread or common;
 the extent or frequency of occurrence of a disease or condition in a given population at a specific time

*synonym*: preponderance, currency, frequency

(1) **prevalence** rate, (2) high **prevalence** of a diabetes
The **prevalence** of allergies has increased in recent years.

desire

- n. a strong feeling of wanting to have or do somethingsynonym: ambition, appetite, greed
- (1) unsatisfied **desire**, (2) fleshly **desire**Low sexual **desire** typically correlates with low testosterone levels.

#### faith

 n. complete trust in something or someone's ability or knowledge; a strong belief in religion, divine power, etc.

synonym: belief, trust, confidence

(1) religious **faith**, (2) **faith** in government He kept his robust **faith** in his company.

# discrepancy

 a lack of consistency or agreement between two or more facts, figures, or sets of information; a disagreement, inconsistency, or divergence

synonym: inconsistency, difference, disparity

(1) significant discrepancy, (2) a discrepancy in the report

There is a **discrepancy** between the study's findings and the collected data.

## comparative

adj. relating to the comparison of different things or groups; denoting a degree of difference or comparison between two or more things; characterized by comparison or contrast

synonym: relative, approximate, correlative

(1) **comparative** viewpoint, (2) **comparative** analysis The **comparative** study of different cultures is fascinating and informative.

evaluate

v. to assess or estimate the quality, significance, quantity, or value of something

synonym: assess, estimate, consider

(1) **evaluate** the grant proposal, (2) **evaluate** a situation The meeting aims to **evaluate** possible choices.

contagion

 the spread of a disease or harmful influence from one person or thing to another

synonym: infection, disease, transmission

(1) a **contagion** of fear, (2) **contagion** effect
The government has implemented measures to prevent the **contagion** of COVID-19, such as social distancing and mandatory mask-wearing.

# colleague

 one of a group of a coworker, especially in a profession or a business

synonym: coworker, associate, fellow

collaborate with colleagues,
 former colleague
 decided to seek counseling on the advice of my colleague.

harass

 to annoy, torment, or pester persistently; to subject someone to repeated or chronic attacks or unwelcome attention

synonym: pester, annoy, bother

(1) harass the enemy, (2) harass with constant criticism

She was constantly **harassed** by her ex-boyfriend and had to get a restraining order.

#### discontent

- n. dissatisfaction or unhappiness with a situation or condition; a feeling of displeasure or disapprovalsynonym: dissatisfaction, unrest, displeasure
- (1) political **discontent**, (2) widespread **discontent**The worker's **discontent** with their wages led to a strike.

#### threaten

to utter intentions of injury or punishment against someone

synonym: endanger, terrorize, intimidate

(1) **threaten** a healthy relationship, (2) **threaten** national security

Various artificially induced causes are **threatening** our ecosystem.

#### retain

- v. to keep or continue to possess or maintain something synonym: possess, hold, keep on
- retain information, (2) retain a lawyer
   Computers help people retain specific memories.

### attract

- v. to draw or entice someone or something towards them through the qualities they have, especially positive ones synonym: lure, entice, draw in
- (1) attract attention, (2) attract customersThe government is eager to attract international investment.

#### diverse

adj. including numerous categories of individuals or entities;various

synonym: manifold, various, myriad

(1) **diverse** backgrounds, (2) a person of **diverse** talents New York is a city with a **diverse** ethnic population.

# candid

adj. honest, straightforward, and frank in someone's words or actions

synonym: honest, frank, straightforward

(1) **candid** conversation, (2) in my **candid** opinion

The **candid** photography captured the genuine emotions of the moment.

#### showcase

 a display or exhibition of something, typically as a way of promoting it

*synonym*: exhibit, display, presentation

(1) museum **showcase**, (2) **showcase** of innovation The museum's new exhibition is a **showcase** of contemporary art.

## commitment

 a promise or firm decision to do something or to behave in a certain way

*synonym*: burden, obligation, promise

(1) a **commitment** to an alliance, (2) meet his **commitments** 

His business commitments took him to the United States.

# diversity

 n. the quality or fact of many different types of things or people being included in something; a range of different things or people

synonym: variety, multiplicity, variousness

(1) the **diversity** policy of the university, (2) lingual **diversity** He was impressed by the range and **diversity** of the collection.

#### inclusive

adj. including much or everything, and especially including stated limits; not excluding any of the people, things, ideas, etc. involved in something

synonym: cover-all, all-embracing, comprehensive

(1) a fully **inclusive** price, (2) **inclusive** education The university has established a capacity for each nationality as part of its **inclusive** policy.

## insufficient

adj. not enough for a particular purposesynonym: deficient, inadequate, scarce

(1) **insufficient** evidence, (2) there are **insufficient** doctors We had raised a small amount of money from investors, but funds were **insufficient**.

## corruptible

adj. capable of being made to do something dishonest or immoral

synonym: bribable, dishonest, venal

(1) **corruptible** officials, (2) **corruptible** judges
Bureaucracies are more **corruptible** than other systems or organizations.

# promote

v. to encourage or persuade people to like, buy, use, do, or support something; to raise someone to a higher position or rank

synonym: boost, raise, advertise

(1) **promote** a better relationship, (2) **promote** bad behavior The government should do more to **promote** sustainable agribusiness.

## assume

 to think or accept something to be true without having proof of it; to take or begin to have power; to begin to exhibit a specific quality or appearance

synonym: guess, presume, suppose

(1) **assume** a lousy attitude to his boss, (2) **assume** an important role

The following example **assumes** that the capacity of each battery is the same.

### fertile

adj. capable of producing abundant vegetation or crops; intellectually productive

synonym: fruitful, productive, rich

(1) fertile ground, (2) fertile market

Herbs require **fertile** soil in a sunny, sheltered location.

#### realistic

adj. having or showing a sensible and practical idea that is possible to achieve

synonym: practical, pragmatic, down-to-earth

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# (1) a realistic goal, (2) a realistic goal

That story was so **realistic**, and it was scary.

## conflict

 a strong disagreement, argument, or a violent clash between two opposing groups or individuals

synonym: clash, discord, competition

(1) the **conflict** between good and evil, (2) the longstanding **conflict** 

He and I often had **conflicts**, not only in personality but also in ideology.

# anonymous

adj. having no known name, identity, or known source synonym: nameless, unidentified, unnamed

(1) **anonymous** letter, (2) **anonymous** house She received several **anonymous** calls.

# overwhelming

adj. very great or intense; so powerful that you cannot fight or react against it

synonym: overpowering, astounding, amazing

(1) **overwhelming** majority, (2) an **overwhelming** victory He has shown signs of uneasiness and **overwhelming** worry.

# improve

v. to make or become better

synonym: enhance, ameliorate, enrich

(1) **improve** a process, (2) **improve** the test score We want to **improve** ties between our two countries.

# anonymity

 the condition of being anonymous or unidentified; the state of not revealing one's name, identity, or other personal information

synonym: obscurity, secrecy, namelessness

(1) comment with **anonymity**, (2) protect **anonymity**The use of pseudonyms allows individuals to maintain their **anonymity** online.

# shocking

adj. extremely or surprisingly bad, or causing a strong emotional response such as surprise or disgust synonym: startling, surprising, astounding

(1) **shocking** response, (2) **shocking** revelation The news of the accident was **shocking** and left many in shock.

## perpetrate

to commit or carry out a harmful or illegal act, particularly one that involves violence or deception; to be responsible for the creation or continuation of a negative situation

synonym: commit, perform, execute

(1) perpetrate harassment, (2) perpetrate a fraud The criminal decided to **perpetrate** another robbery despite his previous arrest.

# suppose

- to think that something is likely to be actual or possible synonym: guess, assume, presume
- (1) **suppose** you're right, (2) **suppose** beforehand What do you suppose the culprit's motive was?

## stick

to put something, usually a sharp object, into something; to restrict yourself to doing or using one certain thing and not change; (noun) a thin piece of wood or other material

synonym: pierce, adhere, stay

(1) **stick** a key in a lock, (2) fire **stick** You **stick** a bill in the change machine, and the coins pop out.

#### crucial

adj. extremely vital or necessary synonym: essential, pivotal, vital

(1) **crucial** information, (2) a **crucial** issue for women The revitalization of technology companies is **crucial** to the country's growth.

## encouraging

*adj.* giving hope, confidence, or support; inspiring *synonym*: uplifting, inspiring, optimistic

(1) **encouraging** approval, (2) **encouraging** sign The test results were **encouraging** and showed improvement.

# puzzle

 a situation that is difficult to follow or solve; a game, problem, or toy that tests a person's ingenuity or knowledge; (verb) to cause someone to feel confused because of something difficult to understand

synonym: plight, maze, (verb) perplex

(1) crossword **puzzle**, (2) mathematical **puzzle**This jigsaw **puzzle** is challenging because there are no pictures.

# survey

 an investigation of the opinions, behavior, etc. of a particular group of people, made by asking people questions

synonym: study, examination, poll

(1) a comprehensive **survey**, (2) recent **survey**That **survey** shows that people are accepting the tax increase to some extent.

# employee

- n. a person who is hired to work for a business or organization in exchange for wages or salary; a worker synonym: worker, staff, personnel
- (1) **employee** benefits, (2) **employee** evaluation The **employee** handbook outlines the rules and regulations that all employees must follow.

# specific

adj. clearly defined or particular to a certain thing or situation; distinct, explicit, and precise

*synonym*: particular, definite, distinct

(1) **specific** instructions, (2) industry- **specific** regulations
The scientist conducted a study that provided **specific** details about the species' behavior.

#### default

v. to fail to fulfill an obligation or pay a debt when it is due; to fail to meet expectations or perform as required; to choose or accept a predetermined option or condition without making a deliberate selection or choice; (noun) a failure to fulfill an obligation or to meet a requirement; the pre-set or automatic settings that a system or program uses when the user has selected no other options

synonym: fail, neglect, omit

(1) **default** settings, (2) **default** on the mortgage If you don't specify a different option, the computer will **default** to its original settings.

# mitigate

v. to make less severe or less intense; to alleviate or lessen the adverse effects of something

synonym: alleviate, relieve, reduce

(1) **mitigate** risk, (2) **mitigate** a natural disaster Efforts to **mitigate** the effects of climate change require a coordinated and sustained effort by governments, businesses, and individuals.

# identity

n. the fact of being who or what somebody or something is; the features, emotions, or ideas that distinguish persons from one another

synonym: character, personality, individuality

(1) mistaken **identity**, (2) **identity** as an individual The terrorist's **identity** remains unknown.

## cohesive

adj. causing cohesion; bringing people or things togethersynonym: sticky, close-knit, well-integrated

(1) **cohesive** ability, (2) highly **cohesive** group He skillfully combines these fragments into a **cohesive** whole.

# unfortunately

adv. by bad luck; unluckily

synonym: regrettably, unluckily, alas

(1) unfortunately caught in a shower, (2) even more

# unfortunately

The treatments were done but, **unfortunately**, were unsuccessful.

#### individual

- n. a single person or thing, as distinct from a group synonym: person, being, self
- (1) a private **individual**, (2) **individual** freedom
  As an **individual**, he had the right to make his own decisions and live his life as he saw fit.

#### structure

 the way of construction of something and the arrangement of its parts, or a complex thing constructed of many parts

synonym: construction, architecture, establishment

(1) the **structure** of a machine, (2) **structure** and function of the brain
