pollute

conserve

v. to make an area or substance, such as land, air, water, etc., dirty or harmful to living things by adding waste matter or harmful chemicals

synonym: contaminate, corrupt, degrade

(1) pollute the air, (2) pollute the thread

We should do our best not to pollute the environment.

subaverage

adj. below the average or standard level of performance or ability; less than what is considered to be normal or satisfactory

synonym: below average, subpar, inferior

(1) **subaverage** performance, (2) **subaverage** income The students in the **subaverage** group received extra support and resources to help them succeed in school.

pinpoint

v. to locate or identify the exact position in space or time of something

synonym: name, direct, identify

(1) **pinpoint** the problem, (2) **pinpoint** signs of manipulation This radar quickly **pinpoints** the position of the enemy.

rev

a measure of the rate at which an engine or motor rotates, often expressed in revolutions per minute (RPM); (verb) to increase the number of rotations per minute

synonym: revolution, RPM, speed

(1) low- rev engine, (2) rev up the crowd He stepped on the gas pedal, and the engine released a loud rev.

contaminate

to make something impure, unclean, or poisonous by contact or mixture

synonym: defile, pollute, adulterate

(1) **contaminate** with a disease, (2) **contaminate** his ego We strive not to **contaminate** the environment when demolishing petroleum plants.

dilution

the process of making something weaker, less n. concentrated, or less potent by adding or mixing in other substances; the act of reducing the strength or impact of an idea, principle, or tradition

synonym: diluting, reduction, weakening

(1) **dilution** of power, (2) **dilution** of the original message The **dilution** of the chemical solution weakened its strength.

dilute

to make a substance less concentrated by adding a liquid or another substance to it

synonym: weaken, thin, reduce

(1) dilute acid with water, (2) dilute a great idea She **diluted** the concentrated juice with water.

foresee

to perceive or predict; to anticipate or expect something to happen in the future

synonym: predict, anticipate, forecast

(1) **foresee** the consequences, (2) **foresee** challenges I foresee a problem arising if we don't address this issue now.

groundwater

 water that is present beneath the surface of the ground, especially in soil or in pores and crevices in rock

synonym: aquifer, well water, underground water

(1) **groundwater** supply, (2) contaminated **groundwater** The town's main source of water is natural **groundwater**.

firefight

n. a struggle to extinguish a fire; a military engagement in which small arms and other weapons are used

synonym: battle, conflict, fight

pervasive

adj. spreading or existing throughout every part of a thing or place

synonym: extensive, ubiquitous, prevalent
