foresee

nativism

futurist

 a person who studies or predicts trends and developments, particularly in science, technology, or social systems, to anticipate what the future may hold

synonym: foreseer, prophet, fortune-teller

The radical **futurist** predicted that virtual reality would become a standard in everyday life.

multigenerational

adj. involving or encompassing multiple generations,
 particularly within a family or community; relating to or
 affecting people of different age groups or life stages

synonym: cross-generational, intergenerational

(1) multigenerational home, (2) multigenerational workforce

The **multigenerational** family farm has been passed down for generations.

humanize

 to make something or someone more humane or compassionate; to make something more relatable or understandable to humans

synonym: civilize, personalize

(1) humanize my pet, (2) humanize a room

The charity event aims to **humanize** the homeless rather than treat them as mere statistics.

institutionalize

v. to establish or make something a part of an institution (= a place such as a university, hospital, etc.)

synonym: formalize, establish, regularize

(1) **institutionalize** a system, (2) **institutionalize** customary laws

The new policy aims to **institutionalize** the use of renewable energy sources.

chattel

 personal property, especially that which is movable and not fixed to land

synonym: property, possession, asset

(1) **chattel** mortgage, (2) personal property **chattels**

The enslaved people were treated as **chattel** and had no rights or freedoms.

expedite

 to accelerate or speed up a process or task to make it happen more quickly or efficiently; to facilitate the progress of something

synonym: accelerate, hasten, hurry

(1) **expedite** the decision, (2) **expedite** the shipment We need to **expedite** the process if we want to meet our deadline.

Renaissance

 a new growth in activity or enthusiasm in anything, particularly art, literature, or music

synonym: rebirth, golden age

(1) artistic **renaissance**, (2) industrial **renaissance**Folk music is now experiencing a **renaissance**.

memoir

- a historical account or biography written from the writer's knowledge of famous people, places, or events
- synonym: bio, biography
- (1) family **memoir**, (2) publish a **memoir** He wrote his **memoirs** while awaiting trial.

fiance

- n. a person who is engaged to be marriedsynonym: groom-to-be, betrothed, intended
- (1) **fiance** visa, (2) meeting with the **fiance's** family My **fiance** and I are looking for a new apartment after our wedding.

steer

- v. to control the direction or movement of a vehicle; to direct a course of action; to guide or motivate someonesynonym: guide, direct, control
- steer a steady course, (2) steer a conversation
 The captain told him to steer the ship north.

unarmed

adj. without weapons or arms; not carrying any form of weapon or ammunition, or engaging in physical conflict

with weapons

synonym: defenseless, vulnerable, helpless

whisper

millennial

avocado

 a pear-shaped fruit with a hard skin and buttery flesh, commonly eaten raw in salads, sandwiches, or as guacamole

synonym: alligator pear, butter pear, midshipman's butter

supremacy

 the state, condition, or position of being superior to all others in authority, power, or status

incarceration

- *n.* the state of being confined in prison or jail *synonym*: confinement, imprisonment, detention

clap

unicycle

eggshell

drone

lynch

v. to put to death or punish (usually by hanging) without legal authorization or due process, often as an act of mob justice or vigilante action; (noun) a violent punishment, often extrajudicial, in which a mob or group of people seize and kill someone, usually by hanging, as a form of punishment or vengeance
