rogue

 a deceitful and unreliable person; a person who behaves badly

synonym: baddie, con artist, crook

The president states emphatically that the opponent country is a **rogue** state that supports terrorism.

disobedient

adj. refusing to follow the rules or orders, often deliberately or defiantly; showing a lack of respect for authority or established norms

synonym: insubordinate, unruly, defiant

(1) disobedient attitude, (2) disobedient dog

The **disobedient** child refused to clean up after themselves despite constant requests from their parents.

pillage

n. the act of looting or plundering, particularly during times of war or conflict; the theft or destruction of property or valuables; (verb) to rob, loot, or plunder a place or area, usually in a violent and destructive way

synonym: looting, plunder, raid

(1) violent **pillage**, (2) **pillage** gold and other treasures
The army's village **pillage** left the residents without food or shelter.

colossal

adj. extremely large and impressive synonym: gigantic, huge, enormous

(1) **colossal** statue, (2) a **colossal** success The new building is truly **colossal**, towering over the surrounding buildings.

unreported

adj. not told to someone in authority or the public synonym: unlisted, private, confidential

(1) **unreported** results, (2) **unreported** earnings In this country, there is a substantial hidden sector of the economy where private cash transactions go **unreported**.

skew

v. to turn or place at an angle; to make biased or distorted with the result that it is not accurate, fair, normal, etc.

synonym: slant, tilt, distort

(1) **skew** the message, (2) **skew** social values

The results of the poll are **skewed** because it only surveyed a small group of people.

well-being

- n. the state of being happy and healthy and prosperoussynonym: health, welfare, happiness
- (1) the **well-being** of a nation, (2) a sense of **well-being** We are responsible for the care and **well-being** of all our

employees.

undetected

adj. not perceived or discovered

synonym: undiscovered, hidden, concealed

(1) **undetected** cancer, (2) leave the house **undetected**Doctors made mistakes, and diseases remained **undetected**.

aquaculture

 n. the cultivation of aquatic organisms such as fish, seaweed, and shellfish for human consumption, as well as for environmental conservation and research purposes

synonym: fish farming, mariculture, hydroponics

(1) **aquaculture** industry, (2) sustainable **aquaculture** Fish farming is a form of **aquaculture** that has recently gained popularity.

intractable

adj. difficult to manage or control; stubborn or obstinate *synonym*: obstinate, stubborn, unyielding

(1) **intractable** pain, (2) **intractable** situation The **intractable** problem defied a solution.

interconnect

v. to connect similar things

synonym: interlink, complect, annex

directly interconnect with those systems, (2) human activities interconnect with the environment
 Our system can now interconnect with other databases.

contravene

v. to go against or violate a law, rule, or principle; to act contrary to someone's wishes or expectations

synonym: breach, violate, transgress

(1) **contravene** the protocol, (2) **contravene** the rules The company's decision to **contravene** safety regulations put its employees at risk.

sanction

 official permission or approval for an action, especially an economic or political action by a government or international organization; a penalty or punishment imposed for breaking the law, rule, or agreement; (verb) to impose a penalty or punishment for breaking the law, rule, or agreement

synonym: approve, authorize, endorse

(1) Imperial sanction, (2) popular sanction

The government imposed economic **sanctions** on the country.

a measure of the rate at which an engine or motor rotates, often expressed in revolutions per minute (RPM); (verb) to increase the number of rotations per minute

synonym: revolution, RPM, speed

(1) low- rev engine, (2) rev up the crowd

He stepped on the gas pedal, and the engine released a loud **rev**.

armada

rev

 a large fleet of warships or other vessels, typically organized for a specific military purpose and often under the command of a single admiral; a large group of powerful or influential people or things

synonym: fleet, flotilla, squadron

(1) naval **armada**, (2) **armada** ships

The Spanish **Armada** was a powerful fleet of ships that attempted to invade England in 1588.

rickety

adj. wobbly, unsteady, and likely to collapse synonym: unstable, wobbly, shaky

(1) rickety structure, (2) rickety chair

The old wooden bridge was **rickety** and swayed with every step.

capsize

v. to overturn or tip over a boat or other watercraft; to turn upside down or on its side, often as a result of a sudden force or imbalance

synonym: overturn, overturning, tipping

(1) capsize a boat, (2) capsize in the middle of the storm

The strong wind caused the kayak to **capsize**, throwing the paddler into the water.

ashore

adv. on or towards the land, as opposed to the sea or water *synonym*: on the beach, on the shore

(1) bring **ashore**, (2) go **ashore** after sunset The ship finally came **ashore** after a long voyage.

starve

v. to suffer or die from lack of food; to cause someone or something to suffer or die from lack of food; to deprive something of necessary nourishment or sustenance

synonym: famish, hunger

(1) **starve** for a victory, (2) **starve** to death If you don't eat soon, you're going to **starve**.

compel

v. to force or require someone to do something; to exert a strong, irresistible force or pressure that makes someone act in a certain way

synonym: force, oblige, coerce

(1) **compel** a person to submission, (2) **compel** attention The strict deadlines will **compel** the team to work efficiently.

illuminate

v. to light something or to make something lighter or brighter; to make something free from confusion or ambiguity

synonym: brighten, light, adorn

(1) **illuminate** a dark hall, (2) **illuminate** my understanding That biologist **illuminated** the mechanism of heredity.

audacious

 adj. showing a willingness to take bold risks or to do something that is considered unconventional or daring; marked by originality, creativity, or boldness

synonym: bold, daring, fearless

(1) audacious stunt, (2) audacious decision

The young entrepreneur had an **audacious** plan to start his own company.

oceanic

adj. relating to or characteristic of the ocean or its inhabitants; having to do with the vast expanse of saltwater that covers most of the Earth's surface

synonym: marine, pelagic, sea

(1) oceanic climate, (2) oceanic exploration

The **oceanic** waves crashed against the shore, creating a mesmerizing sight.

conservationist

 a person who advocates or acts to protect and preserve the environment and wildlife

synonym: environmentalist

(1) wildlife **conservationist**, (2) dedicated **conservationist** The extinction of this species has been a significant concern for **conservationists**.

pristine

adj. new and completely free from dirt or contaminationsynonym: chaste, pure, immaculate

(1) **pristine** beach, (2) maintain the **pristine** condition It is terrific to camp in **pristine** nature.

uphold

v. to support or defend something, such as a law, idea, decision, etc.

synonym: defend, maintain, sustain

(1) **uphold** the law, (2) **uphold** tradition

The judge may **uphold** the decision of the lower court.

inexhaustible

adj. incapable of being used up or worn out; boundless or limitless in quantity, energy, or endurance

synonym: infinite, exhaustless, limitless

(1) **inexhaustible** optimism, (2) **inexhaustible** curiosity Solar power is an example of an **inexhaustible** source of energy.

outlaw

v. to make something illegal; (noun) a person who has committed a crime or has been legally convicted of a crime

synonym: ban, prohibit, (noun) bandit

(1) **outlaw** racial discrimination, (2) **outlaw** cloning of human cells

Some communities began to **outlaw** alcohol consumption.
