immunization

 the process of making a person or animal immune to a specific disease by administering a vaccine or other preventative measure

synonym: vaccination, shot, inoculation

polio

 an acute infectious disease caused by a virus that attacks nerve cells in the spinal cord and brain, leading to paralysis, muscle weakness, and potentially lifelong disability

synonym: poliomyelitis, infantile paralysis

measles

 a highly infectious viral disease that causes fever, red spots on the skin, and other flu-like symptoms, typically affects children

synonym: rash, red measles, rubella

defy

v. to challenge or dare someone to do something; to resist or disobey a rule, decision, etc.

synonym: challenge, resist, disobey

Senate

a legislative body, especially the upper house of a parliament

synonym: upper house, council, assembly

(1) **Senate** hearing, (2) **Senate** Finance Committee

The **Senate** majority leader announced plans to bring the bill to the floor for a vote.

misinformation

 information that is false or inaccurate, or the act of giving wrong information, especially deliberately

synonym: falsity, misreport, misstatement

(1) **misinformation** about a vaccine, (2) combat **misinformation** on social media

The government called for caution against pseudoscientific **misinformation** about vaccines.

confuse

v. to mistake one thing for another; to make somebody hard to understand

synonym: confound, obscure, disorient

(1) **confuse** the listener, (2) **confuse** fantasy with reality Her remarks **confused** the debate.

empathy

- n. the ability to share another person's feelings or experiences by imagining that person's situationsynonym: compassion, sympathy, tenderness
- (1) full of **empathy**, (2) **empathy** for patients **Empathy** is also necessary to understand history.

mislead

- v. to cause someone to believe something that is not true synonym: misinform, delude, belie
- (1) **mislead** him into trusting her, (2) **mislead** the enemy Our troops pulled back to **mislead** the enemy.

maim

- v. to injure or wound someone seriously, particularly by permanently disabling or disfiguring a body part
 synonym: injure, incapacitate, wound
- (1) maim a victim, (2) maim his hand

The reckless driver **maimed** several pedestrians after losing control of the vehicle.

quitter

- a person who gives up easily or does not have the determination to finish what they have started
- synonym: coward, deserter, surrender
- (1) easy quitter, (2) serial quitter

He was labeled as a **quitter** after he abandoned the project halfway.

takeaway

- a message or conclusion that can be taken away from a situation or piece of information
- synonym: conclusion, message, insight
- (1) takeaway pizza, (2) takeaway message

The main **takeaway** from the meeting was the need for better communication.

intellect

- n. the ability to think logically and comprehend information, especially at an advanced level
- *synonym*: mind, brightness, cleverness
- (1) enrich my intellect, (2) human intellect

Your **intellect** is capable of distinguishing among similar objects.

anecdotal

adj. based on personal accounts or stories that may not be verifiable or representative of a larger population; characterized by anecdotes or casual observations rather than scientific data or empirical evidence

synonym: hearsay, informal, unreliable

(1) anecdotal evidence, (2) anecdotal example

My friend shared an **anecdotal** story about her experience in customer service.

resonate

- v. to be filled with a deep echoing sound
- *synonym*: echo, reverberate, resound
- (1) deeply **resonate** with the consumers, (2) **resonate** in the same frequency

The sound **resonates** well in this theater.

fathomable

- adj. able to be understood or comprehended; able to be measured or explored to a certain depth
- synonym: understandable, comprehensible, intelligible
- (1) **fathomable** explanation, (2) **fathomable** solution The scientific theories presented in the book were **fathomable** even to non-experts.

senator

- a member of a legislative body, especially a member of the U.S. Senate
- synonym: legislator, politician, representative
- (1) junior **senator**, (2) **senator** term

The hawkish **senator** gave a speech on the new bill in the Senate.

unbreakable

- *adj.* not able to be broken or damaged *synonym*: indestructible, durable, sturdy
- (1) **unbreakable** bond, (2) **unbreakable** commitment This titanium bike frame is advertised as **unbreakable**.

unbroken

adj. continuous and not interrupted; (of promises or contracts) not violated or disregarded

synonym: intact, unchanged, continuing

(1) an unbroken horse, (2) unbroken chain

He enjoyed the unbroken quiet of the afternoon at the villa.

sway

v. to move back and forth or side to side gently, often in response to external factors such as wind or water; to influence or persuade someone to do something; to control or dominate something

synonym: swing, oscillate, influence

(1) **sway** back and forth, (2) **sway** to the rhythm
