adj. extremely small; tiny

synonym: tiny, insignificant, microscopic

(1) minuscule amount,	(2) minuscule letters
This ore emits minuscul	le quantities of radiation

doom

n. death, destruction, or some other terrible situation that cannot be avoided

synonym: judgment, destiny, fate

(1) economic **doom**, (2) prophet of **doom**

Everyone was aware of the impending **doom** but was unable to prevent it.

vie

v. to compete or contend for something, usually a prize, position, or advantage; to strive for superiority or mastery in one's field or area of expertise

synonym: compete, contend, strive

(1) **vie** for a trophy, (2) **vie** for attention

They both **vied** for the top spot in the company.

confuse

v. to mistake one thing for another; to make somebody hard to understand

synonym: confound, obscure, disorient

(1) **confuse** the listener, (2) **confuse** fantasy with reality Her remarks **confused** the debate.

quadrate

- a square-shaped object or area
- synonym: square, rectangle, block
- (1) quadrate shape, (2) quadrate ligament

The scientist examined the **quadrate** bone to determine the species of dinosaur it came from.

empathy

 the ability to share another person's feelings or experiences by imagining that person's situation

synonym: compassion, sympathy, tenderness

(1) full of **empathy**, (2) **empathy** for patients

Empathy is also necessary to understand history.

shudder

v. to tremble uncontrollably or convulsively, often due to fear, cold, or intense emotion; to recoil or react strongly

to something unpleasant, disturbing, or shocking *synonym*: tremble, shake, quiver

(1) **shudder** at the thought, (2) **shudder** with fear I couldn't help but **shudder** when I heard the scary noise from the dark alleyway.

sympathize

 to express or feel compassion or understanding for someone else's pain, difficulty, or misfortune; to share in someone else's emotions or experiences

synonym: empathize, understand, commiserate

(1) **sympathize** with a tragic hero, (2) **sympathize** with their situation

I **sympathize** with your struggles and am here to support you through them.

grandparent

- n. a parent of one's father or mother
- (1) great- **grandparent**, (2) person of **grandparent** age She was close to her paternal **grandparents** and often spent summers with them.

divisible

adj. able to be divided into parts, usually with nothing left over

synonym: separable, splittable, partitionable

(1) a divisible number, (2) exactly divisible

The class was divided into groups of four, with each group being **divisible** by two.

adjective

- n. a word that describes a noun or pronounsynonym: modifier, accessory, attribute
- (1) **adjective** clause, (2) an attributive **adjective**The **adjective** "red" describes the color of the apple.

nonbinary

- adj. someone who does not identify as a man or a woman;not relating to, composed of, or including only two thingssynonym: pluralistic, polyphyletic
- (1) nonbinary gender, (2) nonbinary identities

More and more people in various countries believe that the policymaker should change the marriage rules for **nonbinary** people.

mistakenly

adv. in a mistaken or incorrect way; wrongly synonym: incorrectly, erroneously, wrongly

(1) **mistakenly** left his keys, (2) **mistakenly** delete the important file

He **mistakenly** thought the red liquid was juice, but it was paint.

skew

v. to turn or place at an angle; to make biased or distorted with the result that it is not accurate, fair, normal, etc.

synonym: slant, tilt, distort

(1) **skew** the message, (2) **skew** social values

The results of the poll are **skewed** because it only surveyed a small group of people.

cuboid

a geometric shape with six rectangular faces, where the opposite faces are parallel and congruent; a specific bone in the human body, known as the cuboid bone, which is one of the tarsal bones located in the foot; a three-dimensional rectangle

synonym: rectangular, brick-shaped, blocky

(1) medial surface of the **cuboid**, (2) **cuboid-shaped** wireless speaker

The **cuboid** bone is located in the foot and helps with stability during movement.

cisgender

adj. denoting or relating to a person whose sense of personal identity and gender corresponds with their birth sex

synonym: cis, non-trans

(1) **cisgender** identity, (2) **cisgender** person

Cisgender people often don't have to think about their gender identity in the same way that transgender people do

underprivileged

adj. lacking resources, opportunities, or advantages that are necessary for success

synonym: poor, disadvantaged, destitute

(1) poor and **underprivileged** elderly, (2) **underprivileged** communities

The **underprivileged** children were in dire need of food, clothing, and shelter.

pivot

 a change in direction or focus, especially in a business or political strategy; a fixed point that supports something that turns or balances

synonym: center point, fulcrum, heart

(1) center- pivot irrigation, (2) pivot point

The team needed to come up with a **pivot** strategy to turn things around.
