synonym: suitable, timely, practical

amoxicillin

n. (also "amox") a type of antibiotic medication used to treat bacterial infections, such as respiratory tract infections, urinary tract infections, and ear infections; a type of penicillin that is effective against a wide range of bacteria

synonym: penicillin, amox

(1) **amoxicillin** dosage, (2) **amoxicillin** treatment The doctor prescribed **amoxicillin** to treat the patient's bacterial infection.

monogamy

 the practice of being married to only one person at a time; the state of having a mutually exclusive romantic or sexual relationship with one partner

synonym: marriage, monandry, monogamousness

innovate

- v. to introduce new methods, ideas, or products synonym: bring in, introduce, found
- (1) **innovate** a new method, (2) **innovate** the quality of his life

Companies developing self-driving cars consistently **innovate** the emerging technologies.

stapler

 a device used to bind sheets of paper together by driving a small metal staple (= a fastener used to secure multiple sheets of paper together) through them synonym: staple gun, paper clipper, clincher

(1) stapler pins, (2) electric stapler

The heavy-duty **stapler** is perfect for binding thick stacks of paper.

mango

 tropical fruit with smooth, juicy flesh and a large, hard seed in the middle

synonym: fruit, tropical fruit

(1) ripe mango, (2) fresh mango

She cut the **mango** into small pieces and added them to the salad.

scout

n. a person or group sent out to obtain information, gather intelligence, or make observations, typically in a military context; a person or group sent out to explore or prospect for new opportunities, resources, or locations

synonym: scoutmaster, explorer, surveyor

(1) boy **scout**, (2) **scout** troop

The company sent a **scout** to explore new business opportunities in the overseas market.

entrepreneurship

 the process or skill of starting and running a business, particularly a new and innovative one

synonym: self-employment, risk-taking

The government is investing in programs to support **entrepreneurship** and small business development.

arbitrage

n. the practice of buying and selling goods, securities, or currencies in different markets or locations to make a profit from the differences in price between them

synonym: trading, speculation, hedging

The hedge fund manager used arbitrage strategies to profit

from the price differences between securities.

inefficiency

downside

synonym: drawback, negative, disadvantage

apostrophe

 a punctuation mark used to indicate the omission of letters or numbers in a word or to indicate possession; a figure of speech in which a person or thing is addressed directly, as if present, or referred to as if present

synonym: single quote, mark

(1) **apostrophe** placement, (2) double **apostrophe**I added an **apostrophe** to the end of the word "parents" to show that both parents possess something.

narcissist

a person who is excessively self-absorbed, especially regarding their appearance or achievements

synonym: egotist, boaster, braggart

(1) relationship with a **narcissist**, (2) somatic **narcissist** He thinks she is a high **narcissist** because she always talks about herself and her accomplishments.

unicorn

 a mythical horse-like creature with a single horn on its forehead; a privately held startup company that reached a valuation of \$1 billion

synonym: mythical creature, fantasy animal, legendary horse
