synonym: intuition, aptitude, feeling

(1) **instinct** for self-preservation, (2) aggressive **instinct** When faced with a dangerous situation, his initial **instinct** was to flee.

reprimand

v. to express severe disapproval of someone, typically in a formal statement or action; (noun) a rebuke or scolding given to someone, especially by an authority figure, for a mistake or misbehavior

synonym: rebuke, admonition, scolding

(1) **reprimand** me for staying out too late, (2) official **reprimand**

The teacher **reprimanded** the student for cheating on the test.

unfreeze

v. to thaw or unfrost something that has been frozen; to release or remove a restriction or limitation that had been in place, allowing something to move forward or progress

synonym: thaw, unfrost, melt

(1) **unfreeze** assets, (2) **unfreeze** bank accounts We need to **unfreeze** the computer screen, and it's been frozen for hours.

confuse

synonym: confound, obscure, disorient

humanize

 to make something or someone more humane or compassionate; to make something more relatable or understandable to humans

synonym: civilize, personalize

terrifying

adj. very frightening or intimidating

synonym: frightening, intimidating, alarming

marinade

 a liquid mixture of herbs, spices, oil, and vinegar or citrus juice used to flavor and tenderize meat or fish before cooking; a soaking or immersion in this mixture

I love to use a citrus-based **marinade** for seafood dishes.

unnoticed

unaddressed
