synonym: homily, discourse, lecture

#### yearn

- v. to strongly desire or long for something
- synonym: long, desire, crave
- (1) **yearn** after my old days, (2) **yearn** for love

She **yearned** for the days when things were simpler.

#### repress

- v. to restrain or control by force; to suppress feelings or memories
- synonym: suppress, control, curb
- (1) cannot **repress** laughter, (2) **repress** gene expression He **repressed** the memories of his traumatic childhood.

#### acclaim

- praise or admiration that is expressed publicly; (verb) to praise or admire someone or something publicly
- synonym: praise, admiration, welcome
- (1) **acclaim** the winner, (2) treated with royal **acclaim**The actor's performance in the play earned her widespread **acclaim** from the theater community.

#### exile

- n. the state of being forced to leave one's country or home, typically for political or punitive reasons
- synonym: banishment, expulsion, deportation
- (1) exile community, (2) political exile

The **exiled** king lived in poverty in a foreign country for many years.

#### incarceration

- n. the state of being confined in prison or jailsynonym: confinement, imprisonment, detention
- mass incarceration, (2) incarceration rates
   The judge sentenced him to five years of incarceration for embezzlement.

#### segregate

- v. to separate or set apart from others, often based on race, gender, or some other characteristic
- synonym: isolate, separate, divide
- (1) **segregate** by race, (2) **segregate** boys and girls The school board decided to **segregate** students by the

ability to meet their needs better.

#### arresting

 adj. attracting attention or interest; striking or impressive in appearance or effect; halting or stopping the movement or progress of something

synonym: striking, impressive, captivating

(1) an arresting image, (2) an arresting sight

The painting's arresting beauty made it difficult to look away.

#### strife

n. conflict or disagreement, especially between people or groups

synonym: conflict, disagreement, dissension

(1) at strife over the land, (2) civil strife

The country has been wracked by political **strife** for many years.

#### inextricable

*adj.* unable to be separated or escaped from *synonym*: inescapable, inseparable, entangled

(1) an **inextricable** part of life, (2) form an **inextricable** bond

#### enmesh

v. to entangle or involve someone or something in a complicated or difficult situation; to catch or trap as if in a net or mesh; to become entangled or caught up in something

synonym: entangle, trap, ensnare

#### intellect

#### turbulence

 a state of great disturbance, confusion, or uncertainty, often accompanied by violent or disruptive activity or behavior, such as air turbulence during a flight

synonym: choppiness, tumult, agitation

(1) financial **turbulence**, (2) emotional **turbulence**The ride on the rollercoaster was full of dips and turns, creating a feeling of **turbulence**.

#### rampant

 adj. (especially of something bad or unwelcome) flourishing or spreading everywhere in a way that cannot be controlled

synonym: prevalent, dense, uncontrolled

(1) **rampant** growth of weeds, (2) **rampant** corruption In an overly protective industry, violations of the ethics rules tend to be **rampant**.

#### nuanced

adj. characterized by subtle differences in appearance, meaning, sound, etc.

synonym: fine, subtle, slight
