### curable

adj. describing an illness or condition that can be treated or remedied to restore health; having the potential to be alleviated or resolved

synonym: healable, treatable, remediable

(1) curable disease, (2) curable condition

Most cases of the common cold are **curable** with rest and over-the-counter medications.

### cataract

 a clouding of the lens in the eye that affects vision; a large waterfall

synonym: clouding, blurriness, waterfall

(1) the thunder of a cataract, (2) cataract lens

The older man had a **cataract** removed from his eye, which improved his vision significantly.

### grandchild

- n. a child of someone's son or daughtersynonym: offspring, descendant, progeny
- (1) **grandchild-grandparent** relationship, (2) **grandchild** development

The grandparents take care of their **grandchild** while the parents are at work.

### curative

adj. having the power to cure or heal; relating to or intended for medical treatment or healing

*synonym*: healing, therapeutic, medicinal

(1) curative treatment, (2) curative effect

The natural hot springs were said to have **curative** properties for those with sore muscles and joints.

### pterygium

 growth of tissue on the cornea (= the clear outer layer of the eye), often caused by prolonged exposure to the sun and wind

synonym: wing of the eye, conjunctival growth

(1) **pterygium** surgery, (2) **pterygium** removal Long-term exposure to sunlight can increase the risk of developing **pterygium**.

### ostracize

v. to exclude someone from a group or society by general consent; to avoid speaking to or dealing with intentionally

synonym: exclude, shun, isolate

(1) ostracize individual, (2) ostracize group

His peers ostracized him for his controversial beliefs.

### earmark

v. to designate or set aside a particular amount of money, resources, or time for a specific purpose or project; to identify or distinguish a particular characteristic or quality of something

synonym: designate, allocate, assign

(1) **earmark** a plot of land, (2) **earmark** legislation The government needs to **earmark** funds for infrastructure improvements.

### philanthropy

 the practice of voluntarily helping the poor, especially by giving money

synonym: altruism, benevolence, generosity

(1) **philanthropy** organization, (2) private **philanthropy** Tech billionaires often spend the majority of their time on **philanthropy**.

### optometrist

a healthcare professional who specializes in the examination, diagnosis, and treatment of vision and eye-related disorders and who may prescribe and fit corrective lenses or other optical aids

synonym: eye doctor, optician, oculist

(1) optometrist appointment, (2) licensed optometrist I visited an **optometrist** to have my eyes checked for a new prescription for glasses.

### trajectory

the curved path followed by an object moving through space

synonym: course, curve, orbit

(1) career trajectory, (2) a trajectory missile The company has shown an excellent growth trajectory over the years.

adj. suitable or happening at a time that is suitable or convenient for a particular purpose

synonym: suitable, timely, practical

- (1) opportune occasion, (2) an opportune remark The phone rang at the most **opportune** time.
- a break or fissure in a relationship, organization, or physical structure; a large crack in the ground, rock, or other surfaces

synonym: split, break, gap

synonym: glimpse, look, glance

- (1) rift between friends, (2) geological rift Their disagreement caused a **rift** in their friendship.
- a quick or furtive look; (verb) to take a quick and secret

# look at something

(1) sneak **peek**, (2) **peek** at others' misfortune

She took a quick **peek** inside the box before closing it again.

## smartphone

a mobile phone that functions as a computer and connects to the Internet

### opportune

rift

### peek

(1) **smartphone** app developer, (2) **smartphone** addict Internet traffic volumes have increased significantly with the advent of **smartphones**.

### visionary

- adj. having or showing exceptional foresight and imagination; not practical or realizable; speculativesynonym: prophetic, far-sighted, imaginative
- visionary business, (2) visionary ideas
  The visionary leader had a clear plan for the company's future.

### disrupt

v. to prevent or stop something, especially an event, activity, or process, from continuing in the usual way by causing a problem or disturbance

synonym: interrupt, disturb, break into

(1) **disrupt** a well-ordered condition, (2) **disrupt** sleep I'm so sorry to **disrupt** you when you're pretty busy.

### industrious

- adj. hardworking, diligent, and persistent in effortsynonym: diligent, hardworking, assiduous
- (1) **industrious** worker, (2) **industrious** student He was known to be very **industrious** and would often work late into the night.

### financier

 a person or organization that deals with or manages large sums of money, particularly for investment or financial trading purposes

synonym: banker, investor, capitalist

(1) **financier** scandals, (2) powerful **financier**The wealthy **financier** made a generous donation to the charity.

# straightaway

adv. immediately or without any delay or hesitation; without any deviation or detour

synonym: directly, immediately, straight

(1) turn straightaway, (2) go straightaway

I accelerated **straightaway** to catch up to the car ahead of me on the highway.

### perpetuate

- v. to make something continue or prevail for a long time synonym: eternalize, preserve, maintain
- (1) **perpetuate** a myth, (2) **perpetuate** chronic pain That work **perpetuates** his fame.
