overfishing

 the removal of too many fish from a body of water, causing a decline in population levels and harm to the ecosystem

synonym: overharvesting, over-exploitation, depletion

The ocean's ecosystem is being threatened by **overfishing**, causing many species to become endangered.

dwindle

v. to gradually decrease in size, amount, or strength; to become smaller

synonym: shrink, decrease, fade

seabird

a bird species that spends much of its life on or near the sea, often feeding on fish and other marine animals
 synonym: seafowl, oceanic bird

The fishermen were alarmed to see a flock of **seabirds** circling above the water.

dolphin

 a marine mammal that typically has a beaklike snout, a streamlined body, and flippers and that feeds on fish and squid

onboard

mangrove

bulldoze
