convict

overturn

- v. to turn something upside down; to upset synonym: flip over, upset, topple
- overturn a decision, (2) overturn a table
 The court overturned the original verdict.

outcry

- n. a strong expression of public protest, anger, or dissentsynonym: protest, objection, dissent
- (1) a great **outcry**, (2) national **outcry**The **outcry** against the new policy was heard loud and clear by the government.

counterintuitive

gruesome

adj. causing horror or disgust

synonym: appalling, horrific, terrible

The **gruesome** crime scene was difficult for the detectives to stomach.

horrify

v. to shock or disgust greatly

synonym: shock, dismay, terrify

(1) horrify audience, (2) horrify victims

The series of terrorist attacks **horrify** the entire nation.

exonerate

v. to clear someone of blame or accusation; to free someone from responsibility or guilt

synonym: absolve, clear, acquit

(1) **exonerate** from blame, (2) **exonerate** the defendant The DNA evidence **exonerated** the suspect, proving his innocence.

iceberg

a large piece of ice floating in the sea, detached from a glacier

synonym: glacier, ice mass, floe

(1) hit an iceberg, (2) iceberg melting

The ship encountered a series of **icebergs** and had to change its course.

alarming

adj. causing concern or apprehension; causing a feeling of danger, harm, or emergency; unsettling or disturbing

synonym: forbidding, concerning, disturbing

(1) alarming news, (2) alarming statistics

The sudden rise in crime rates in our neighborhood is quite alarming.

incarcerate

 to put or keep somebody in prison or in a place from which they cannot escape

synonym: confine, detain, imprison

(1) incarcerate the murderer, (2) incarcerate her for life

He was **incarcerated** for the duration of the war.

blatant

adj. completely obvious, often offensively or inappropriately; characterized by shameless or brazen behavior

synonym: obvious, flagrant, conspicuous

(1) blatant hypocrisy, (2) blatant disregard

Fact-checkers quickly exposed the politician's **blatant** lie.

fingerprint

- n. a unique pattern of ridges and valleys on the surface of a finger that can be used to identify a personsynonym: print, mark, impression
- (1) **fingerprint** at a crime scene, (2) **fingerprint** identification

The police used a **fingerprint** scanner to identify the suspect.

lye

 a highly alkaline solution made by soaking hardwood ashes in the water, used in the production of soap, detergents, and other cleaning agents; a caustic substance

synonym: caustic soda, sodium hydroxide, alkaline solution

The drain cleaner contains caustic **lye**, and should be handled with care.

impair

- v. to damage something or make it weaker or worse synonym: degrade, mar, deface

pointless

adj. having no purpose or reason; serving no useful function; meaningless or senseless

synonym: meaningless, purposeless, worthless

befriend

lenient

oversimplify

leniency

n. the quality of being kind or merciful in the administration of punishment

neuroscience

anatomical
