monk

#### enlightenment

 n. education that results in understanding and the spread of knowledge

synonym: civilization, awareness, sophistication

#### bewilder

- v. to confuse or puzzle someone; to cause someone to become lost or disoriented in thought or perceptionsynonym: perplex, confound, puzzle

#### gong

 a metal disk that produces a deep, resonant sound when struck with a mallet or other object, often used in percussion music or as a signal in various contexts

synonym: bell, chime, clang

### incomprehensible

adj. impossible to understand or explain; not able to be grasped or comprehended

#### surreal

adj. strange and unreal; having an oddly dreamlike quality synonym: dreamlike, fantastical, unreal

The dreamlike quality of the painting gave it a surreal feel.

#### contradict

v. to deny the truth of a statement by stating the opposite; to be in conflict with

synonym: conflict, oppose, belie

#### proverb

 a short saying that expresses a truth or gives advice based on practical experience

*synonym*: adage, saying, maxim

reminds us to focus on deeds instead of words.

#### monastic

adj. relating to monk or monasticism; ascetic or austere in lifestyle or habits

synonym: contemplative, solitary, austere

The **monastic** lifestyle of the monks involved living in solitude and silence.

#### illogical

adj. not making sense or not based on sound reasoning

synonym: irrational, senseless, nonsensical

(1) illogical argument, (2) illogical reasoning

His argument made no sense and was completely illogical.

#### anecdote

a short and amusing or interesting story about a real incident or person

synonym: story, account, tale

(1) personal anecdote, (2) funny anecdote

She entertained the guests with **anecdotes** about her travels and experiences.

#### ambiguity

*n*. the quality of being open to more than one interpretation; the uncertainty of meaning

synonym: uncertainty, vagueness, obscurity

(1) free from **ambiguity**, (2) avoid **ambiguity** in writing The **ambiguity** in the instructions made it difficult for her to complete the task.

#### paradox

 a statement, situation, or person that has two opposite facts or features and therefore seems impossible, is difficult to understand, or is strange;

synonym: incongruity, dichotomy, contradiction

(1) French **paradox**, (2) the **paradox** of the heap There are many theories to explain this **paradox**.

#### puzzling

adj. confusing or difficult to understand; mysterioussynonym: baffling, confusing, enigmatic

#### confuse

intern

v. to mistake one thing for another; to make somebody hard to understand

synonym: confound, obscure, disorient

### misguided

ridicule

synonym: derision, mockery, satire
