obsess

 to fill the mind of someone continually so that one can't think of anything else

synonym: torment, beset, engross

(1) **obsess** over her weight, (2) he is **obsessed** with the fear

He's utterly **obsessed** with his promotion.

biosphere

 the part of the Earth and its atmosphere in which living organisms exist, including plants, animals, and microorganisms

synonym: ecosphere, ecospace, ecosystem

(1) terrestrial **biosphere**, (2) artificial **biosphere**The balance of the **biosphere** is crucial for the survival of species.

seafloor

n. the bottom of the ocean

synonym: ocean floor, benthic zone, abyssal plain

(1) **seafloor** exploration, (2) **seafloor** mapping
The oceanographer studied the **seafloor** topography to understand how it had changed over time.

pristine

adj. new and completely free from dirt or contamination *synonym*: chaste, pure, immaculate

subsurface

adj. situated or located beneath the surface of something; existing or occurring within the deeper layers of a material or object, often referring to areas below the Earth's surface

synonym: beneath the surface, underground, subterranean

(1) **subsurface** mining, (2) **subsurface** oil reserves The **subsurface** layers of the ocean are still largely unexplored.

hazy

adj. not clear due to a lack of recollection, comprehension, or detail; unsure or perplexed about something

synonym: blurred, clouded, foggy

(1) hazy dream, (2) hazy atmosphere

My memories of the holiday were **hazy**.

fingerprint

 a unique pattern of ridges and valleys on the surface of a finger that can be used to identify a person

synonym: print, mark, impression

(1) **fingerprint** at a crime scene, (2) **fingerprint** identification

The police used a **fingerprint** scanner to identify the suspect.

jumble

v. to mix or mingle various items, objects, or ideas together in a disordered or confused way, often resulting in a messy or chaotic situation; to create a disorderly or confusing arrangement of things

synonym: mix, scramble, mess up

(1) **jumble** in some herbs and spices, (2) **jumble** together different colors

The children **jumbled** up the puzzle pieces and had to start over.

infinitesimal

 adj. extremely small or tiny; almost negligible in size or quantity

synonym: tiny, minuscule, microscopic

(1) infinitesimal variation, (2) infinitesimal change

The scientist used an **infinitesimal** amount of the compound in their experiment.

ancestor

- n. a person from whom one is descended; a forefathersynonym: forebear, forefather, progenitor

chimpanzee

a small, very intelligent ape found in west and central
 Africa with black or brown fur

gastrointestinal

coli

difficile

opportunistic

- adj. making use of a current situation to get power or advantage, especially regardless of planning or principlesynonym: timeserving, conciliatory

pathogen

 a bacterium, virus, or other microorganism that causes disease

synonym: germ, microbe, bacterium

ethnography

 the study of social groups and cultures, often conducted through observation, interviews, and analysis of primary sources; a written account of such a study

synonym: anthropology, cultural analysis

photosynthesis

- n. the process through which plants and other organisms transform light energy into chemical energy, which is then released through cellular respiration to power the organism's activities.

circulatory
