sheltered

 adj. protected or shielded from danger or harmful influences; inexperienced or innocent of certain unpleasantness or harsh realities of life

synonym: protected, secure, guarded

germ

 a very tiny living that causes the disease; a piece of something such as an organism, concept, etc., capable of growing into a new one or part of one

Jewish

synonym: Judaic

inaccessible

adj. unable to travel to or reach; not available synonym: inapproachable, unreachable, remote

(1) inaccessible to an unauthorized user, (2) inaccessible areas

Heavy snow made it **inaccessible** to go to the mountain village.

paralysis

a condition in which you are unable to move or lose control of part or most of the body because of illness or injury

synonym: immobility, stiffness, palsy

(1) moral paralysis, (2) paralysis in the leg Massive demonstrations lead to total paralysis of transportation.

poliomyelitis

a viral disease caused by the poliovirus, often affecting the nervous system and leading to paralysis (= being unable to move the body) or muscle weakness

synonym: polio, infantile paralysis

sequela

frightening

motley

riddle

paddy
