## shrapnel

n. fragments of a bomb, shell, or other explosive object that are scattered in many directions upon detonation and can cause injury or damage

synonym: fragments, debris, shreds

## hospitalize

- v. to admit someone to a hospital for medical treatment synonym: admit, place in hospital

#### sinew

 a tough, fibrous tissue that connects muscles to bones, allowing for movement and strength; a source of strength, energy, or resilience synonym: tendon, ligament, muscle fiber

(1) flexible **sinews**, (2) **sinew** injury

The hunter aimed at the animal's **sinew**, knowing it would be a fatal shot.

## imaginable

adj. capable of being imaginedsynonym: conceivable, plausible, possible

#### ancestor

- n. a person from whom one is descended; a forefathersynonym: forebear, forefather, progenitor

#### immerse

## peacetime

## firefight

 a struggle to extinguish a fire; a military engagement in which small arms and other weapons are used

synonym: battle, conflict, fight

(1) killed in a **firefight**, (2) turn into a **firefight**. The platoon experienced a full-scale **firefight**.

### carnage

n. the killing or slaughter of a large number of people,
 especially in a battle or war; a situation in which many
 people are killed or injured in a violent way

synonym: slaughter, massacre, bloodshed

(1) carnage on the battlefield, (2) brutal carnage

The battlefield was filled with **carnage**, a terrible reminder of the horrors of war.

tote

v. to carry or transport something, especially by hand or with some effort; to haul or convey something from one place to another

synonym: carry, haul, transport

(1) **tote** a cell-phone, (2) **tote** her books in a colorful backpack

Can you help me tote these groceries to the car?

grenade

 a hand-held explosive device designed to be thrown or projected toward a target and detonate upon impact or after a specified time

synonym: bomb, explosive, shrapnel

(1) grenade explosion, (2) smoke grenade

The soldier threw a grenade to destroy the enemy's bunker.

ingrained

adj. deeply rooted in someone's mind or behavior; difficult to change due to being established for a long time

synonym: inborn, embedded, deep-seated

(1) ingrained habit, (2) ingrained prejudice

Her fear of dogs was **ingrained** after a traumatic experience in childhood.

calibration

 the process of ensuring that an instrument, machine, or process is accurate and functioning correctly, often involving comparison to a standard or reference

synonym: adjustment, tuning, standardization

(1) calibration error, (2) calibration settings

The **calibration** of the equipment was vital to ensure accurate measurements.

#### calibrate

 to measure or adjust something, typically a machine or device, to ensure accurate functioning or to match a standard or desired level of performance

synonym: adjust, fine-tune

(1) **calibrate** machinery, (2) **calibrate** measurements It's important to **calibrate** the equipment regularly to ensure accurate results.

#### drown

 to die or cause to die by being unable to breathe underwater

synonym: douse, drench, overwhelm

(1) **drown** in a bath, (2) I was **drowned** in work Floods have the potential to **drown** any subsurface animals easily.

## probabilistic

adj. characterized by the influence of chance or probability; involving the use of statistical models or methods to estimate likelihoods or risks

synonym: probable, statistical, likely

(1) **probabilistic** model, (2) **probabilistic** approach In a **probabilistic** system, the outcome is uncertain and can vary based on chance.

#### astronomical

 adj. relating to astronomy or the study of celestial bodies and phenomena; very large or immense in scale or magnitude

synonym: huge, vast, enormous

(1) **astronomical** observation, (2) **astronomical** numbers The cost of the new equipment was **astronomical** and beyond the company's budget.

#### makeshift

adj. serving as a temporary substitute or solution; improvisedsynonym: improvised, temporary, ad-hoc

#### ratchet
