### protest

## brutality

## rally

v. a public meeting of a group of people intended to arouse enthusiasm

*synonym*: gathering, meetup, demonstration

## pro-life

adj. describing beliefs, policies, or advocacy that support the protection and preservation of human life, particularly about issues such as abortion, euthanasia, and capital punishment, focusing on the value and rights of the unborn or vulnerable individuals

synonym: anti-abortion, pro-birth, anti-choice

(1) pro-life legislation, (2) pro-life stance

The **pro-life** movement advocates for the protection of unborn children.

## pro-choice

- adj. advocating for the right of women to have control over their reproductive health and decisions, especially regarding abortion
- synonym: pro-abortion, pro-reproductive rights, pro-women's choice
- (1) **pro-choice** movement, (2) **pro-choice** stance Those who are **pro-choice** believe in providing women with access to safe and legal abortions.

## deport

v. to force someone to leave a country, typically on the grounds of illegal status or for having committed a crime synonym: expel, banish, repatriate

(1) **deport** a refugee, (2) **deport** dissidents from the party The government has decided to **deport** illegal immigrants back to their home countries.

#### advocate

 a person who supports or suggests an idea, development, or way of doing something

synonym: proponent, exponent, promoter

#### surveillance

 the act of carefully monitoring a person suspected of a crime or a place where a crime may be committed or expected

## government

 the group of people with authority to control a country or state

synonym: administration, regime, state

#### sensitive

 adj. able to notice slight changes, signals, or influences; able to feel or perceive other's feelings; susceptible to the things people say or do

synonym: exposed, susceptible, keen

#### essential

adj. indispensable; fundamental synonym: critical, crucial, basic

(1) essential amino acid, (2) essential commodities of life

Trial and error is an **essential** part of education.

#### enforcement

n. the act of ensuring that rules, regulations, or laws are obeyed or implemented; the act of applying force or pressure to compel compliance with rules or laws

synonym: implementation, application, execution

The **enforcement** of the new traffic laws led to a decrease in accidents.

#### nation

 a large organized community of people living in a particular country or region and having a particular culture

synonym: country, state, sovereign entity

#### abuse

- n. the use of something in an incorrect or harmful manner synonym: misuse, misconduct, vilification
- (1) the problem of drug **abuse**, (2) victim of sexual **abuse** Our company has an audit team that monitors directors for **abuse** of authority.

## origin

- n. the first existence or beginning of somethingsynonym: root, source, ancestor
- (1) origin of information, (2) racial originThere are various hypotheses concerning the origin of life.

#### orientation

 a person's basic attitudes, beliefs, and preferences about particular things; a course introducing a new situation or environment

synonym: direction, introduction, frontage

(1) sexual **orientation**, (2) the school **orientation**There will be an **orientation** lecture for new students this afternoon.

#### mall

a large, enclosed shopping center that typically contains many stores, restaurants, and other businesses
 synonym: shopping center, shopping complex

(1) largest electronic **mall**, (2) **mall** crawler Many people go to the shopping **mall** to socialize and spend time with friends.

#### racial

adj. of or related to the race (= classification of humans into groups based on physical traits or social relations)synonym: ethnic, tribal, ethnical

#### tolerance

## legendary

#### movement

a group of people working together to achieve a shared goal, especially a political, social, or artistic one; the process of moving or being moved, physically or figuratively

#### communist

adj. relating to or supporting the political ideology of communism (= a form of socialism that abolishes private ownership)

#### intent

#### destabilize

#### bug

 any tiny insect; a fault or defect in a computer program, system, or machine

synonym: insect, bacterium, microbe

#### conversation

*n.* an informal talk between two or more people to exchange their views, ideas, information, etc.

synonym: chat, discussion, dialogue

## strategy

 a detailed plan of action designed to achieve a long-term or overall goal.

synonym: approach, procedure, scenario

(1) military strategy, (2) develop a strategy

Our plan includes a comprehensive marketing **strategy**.

#### tactics

 n. the methods or strategies used to achieve a specific goal or outcome, particularly in the context of military, business, or sports

synonym: strategy, maneuvers, plan

(1) blitz tactics, (2) political tactics

The marketing team developed new **tactics** to boost sales.

### opportune

adj. suitable or happening at a time that is suitable or convenient for a particular purpose

synonym: suitable, timely, practical

(1) **opportune** occasion, (2) an **opportune** remark The phone rang at the most **opportune** time.

#### discredit

v. to harm the reputation or credibility of someone or something; to make something appear untrue or unreliable

synonym: disprove, undermine, disgrace

#### undermine

v. to make someone or something less powerful, less effective, weaker gradually; to make someone's fame, confidence, or authority less effective or weaker gradually

#### handwritten

adj. written with a pen or pencil rather than typed

 a preliminary version of something that is not yet in its final form

synonym: blueprint, outline, rough drawing

#### archives

a collection of historical documents or records providing information about a place, institution, or group of people synonym: records, documents, repository

(1) historical archives, (2) digital archives

The **archives** at the library contain a wealth of information about the city's history.

## clergyman

a man who is a member of the clergy (= religious leader), especially a minister or priest in the Christian Church

synonym: minister, pastor, priest

(1) unfrocked clergyman, (2) clergyman's duty

The Catholic **clergyman** led the congregation in prayer.

#### fraud

 the crime of gaining money or financial benefits by deceiving people; a person who makes deceitful pretenses

synonym: trickery, deceit, blackmail

(1) get money by **fraud**, (2) victim of **fraud** 

The police arrested them for committing insurance **fraud**.

## encourage

v. to give someone support, confidence, or hope; to persuade someone to do or continue to do something by making it easier for them and making them believe it is a good thing to do

synonym: facilitate, persuade, stimulate

(1) **encourage** a sense of affinity, (2) **encourage** antisocial behavior

They **encouraged** customers with a premium for loyal patronage.

#### commit

- v. to do something illegal or wrong
- synonym: engage, carry out, execute
- (1) commit suicide, (2) commit mistakes

The military has **committed** an abuse of human rights.

#### suicide

n. the act of killing yourself intentionally

synonym: self-destruction, self-annihilation, felo-de-se

(1) commit suicide, (2) suicide attack

In an economically prosperous country, most male **suicide** is due to child support problems.

## filthy

adj. dirty or unclean, often to an extreme or offensive degree; morally offensive or obscene

synonym: dirty, grimy, soiled

The hotel room was **filthy** with dirty sheets and stained carpets.

#### abnormal

adj. not typical, usual, or regular, especially in a way that is bad

synonym: aberrant, bizzare, unusual

#### fraudulent

adj. involving deception or dishonesty; intended to deceive or defraud; false or misleading

## megalomania

 a psychological condition characterized by extreme delusions of power, wealth, or influence; an exaggerated sense of self-importance or belief in one's abilities to control or dominate others

## president

## democracy

alike

spy

 a person who is employed or trained to observe or gather information in secret, often for military or political purposes; a person who secretly or illegally gathers information about a private individual or organization

synonym: agent, undercover operative

The government recruited a **spy** to gather information on a suspected terrorist cell

civic

adj. of or relating to a town, city, or the people who live in it synonym: community, civic, communal

(1) civic activity, (2) civic center

The city promotes **civic** collaboration in community development

devote

v. to commit or dedicate oneself or one's time, effort, or energy to a particular task or purpose

synonym:

## commit, dedicate, apply

(1) **devote** all of my energies, (2) **devote** my own life He **devoted** himself to studying the history of ancient civilizations.

#### elect

v. to choose someone for a specific position by voting for them; to decide or choose to do something

synonym: select, choose, prefer

(1) **elect** the school board, (2) **elect** death Every five years, the provincial governors are **elected**.

#### rival

 a person, company, or thing competing with others for the same thing or in the same area

synonym: adversary, competitor, contender

(1) **rival** bidder, (2) merge with a **rival** company He interfered with his **rivals** in various ways during the campaign.

#### committee

 a group of people appointed or elected to perform a specific function or manage a particular task, often within a larger organization

synonym: panel, board, council

## headquarter

 the central office or location from which a business or organization is managed

*synonym*: base, center, command

## burglar

 a person who unlawfully enters a building or other property to steal or commit another crime

synonym: thief, robber, intruder

## eventually

adv. finally, particularly after a long time or a lot of struggle, complications, and so on

synonym: finally, someday, ultimately

## squelch

v. to make a sucking sound like that made by walking heavily through mud; to suppress or silence something completely; to crush or quash something, especially through force or authority

synonym: squish, slosh, splash

She had to **squelch** her anger before she spoke to her boss about the issue.

## challenger

 a person or thing that challenges or competes with someone or something else; a contestant in a

## competition or challenge

#### occasion

 a time or event that is suitable or appropriate for something to happen or be done; a particular event or circumstance that requires or allows for something to be done

#### reform

 the act of improving or correcting something that is wrong or bad; a change made to correct a flaw or problem

*synonym*: change, modify, improve

(1) economic **reform**, (2) **reform** movement The government is proposing a **reform** to the healthcare system to make it more accessible and affordable for all citizens.

## primary

adj. first or highest in rank, order, or importance; most fundamental or essential; pertaining to the initial or introductory stage of something, such as a school year or election cycle

synonym: chief, main, fundamental

(1) primary school, (2) primary education

The **primary** cause of the accident was due to the icy road conditions.

## interpose

 to intervene, insert, or come between two parties or things; to interrupt or interject during a conversation or discussion

*synonym*: interrupt, intervene, butt in

(1) **interpose** an objection, (2) **interpose** a question

He **interposed** himself between the arguing couple, hoping

to diffuse the tension.

## judge

 a person who makes decisions in a court of law; (verb) to determine the result of or form a critical opinion of something

synonym: arbiter, justice, (verb) deduce

(1) judge a competition, (2) an associate judge

The strict judge ruled in favor of the plaintiff in the case.

#### relation

 the way two persons or groups of people feel and act toward one another

synonym: association, linkage, connection

(1) **relation** between cause and effect, (2) **relation** of inclusion

The industrial **relations** laws were passed with little to no alteration.

## investigator

 a person whose job is to conduct an investigation or inquiry into something, often to gather information or evidence

synonym: inspector, sleuth, detective

(1) private investigator, (2) clinical investigator

The forensic **investigator** collected DNA samples from the crime scene to identify the perpetrator

## legitimate

adj. accordant with or allowed by law; lawful

synonym: lawful, honest, fair

(1) a **legitimate** child, (2) **legitimate** question

Public political demonstrations are considered **legitimate** rights for citizens.

#### discriminate

v. to treat a person or particular group of people worse or better than another, especially in an unfair way; to recognize or perceive the difference between people or things

synonym: show prejudice, segregate, differentiate

(1) discriminate against women employees,

## (2) discriminate between different things

You should not **discriminate** against minorities.

#### wiretap

 to secretly listen to a people's conservation or get their information by connecting a listening device to their phone line

synonym: tap, bug, intercept

## trump

- a playing card with a picture of a trumpeter on it, used in certain card games

#### tower

- a structure that is exceptionally high in proportion to its width and either forms part of a building or stands alone
   synonym: building, belfry, edifice
- (1) a bell **tower**, (2) the **tower** on a cliff She is a **tower** of strength for our team in trouble.

## ordinary

adj. not different, exceptional, or unexpected in any way, especially in quality, ability, size, or degree

synonym: mundane, prosaic, average

(1) an **ordinary** school, (2) **ordinary** annual revenue The **ordinary** session of the Diet opened.

rev

 a measure of the rate at which an engine or motor rotates, often expressed in revolutions per minute (RPM); (verb) to increase the number of rotations per minute

*synonym*: revolution, RPM, speed

(1) low- **rev** engine, (2) **rev** up the crowd

He stepped on the gas pedal, and the engine released a loud

#### addiction

n. the inability to stop using or doing something as a habit, especially something harmful

synonym: dependence

(1) alcohol **addiction**, (2) **addiction** to foreign oil He is now fighting his **addiction** to drugs.

## religion

 a deep conviction in a supernatural power that controls human destiny

synonym: faith, creed, belief

 religion sociology, (2) freedom of religion
 Their religion strictly prohibits them from drinking or gambling.

## charity

 an organization that helps people in need, especially by providing food, shelter, or money; a kindly and sympathetic attitude toward people

synonym: philanthropy, benevolence, generosity

(1) charity work, (2) ask charity

She volunteers at a local **charity** every weekend to help those in need.

#### donate

v. to give money, food, clothes, etc. to help a person or organization

*synonym*: bestow, contribute, grant

(1) **donate** to charity, (2) **donate** blood to the Red Cross Our company **donates** to the school endowment fund every year.

#### candidate

n. a person who is seeking or being considered for some kind of position, title, honor, or award; a job applicant synonym: applicant, nominee, contender

(1) candidate selection, (2) PhD candidate

The **candidate's** platform focused on healthcare reform and reducing income inequality.

## dragnet

 a careful and complete search taken by the police that is intended to catch criminals; a net that is pulled through a river or across the ground to catch fish or animal

synonym: trawl

(1) **dragnet** fishing, (2) **dragnet** for the criminal He was caught in a police **dragnet** and arrested.

#### convention

 a large formal assembly of people who do a particular job or have a similar interest or of a political party; something regarded as a normative example

synonym: meeting, conference, congress

(1) **convention** center, (2) political **convention** They met at biennial **conventions**.

## highlight

v. to make something prominent, mainly so that people give it more attention

synonym: feature, emphasize, stress

(1) **highlight** a string in red, (2) **highlight** an important difference

#### facial

adj. of or relating to a person's face synonym: forward, front, surface

(1) facial nerve, (2) facial expressions

Facial profiling is a new form of airport security.

## recognition

 the action or process of recognizing or being recognized, especially by remembering; an agreement that something is true or legal

synonym: acknowledgement, identification, credit

(1) recognition award, (2) joint recognition

He was given **recognition** for his outstanding work in the field of medicine.

## identify

 to recognize someone or something and say or prove who or what they are synonym: determine, specify, recognize

(1) **identify** handwriting, (2) **identify** gene sequences I will introduce you to how to **identify** the leading causes of the malfunction.

#### troublemaker

 a person who intentionally causes difficulties or problems for others, often by disruptive or provocative behavior; a person who tends to create or attract trouble or controversy

*synonym*: troublemonger, instigator, agitator

(1) **troublemaker** kid, (2) accused **troublemaker**The teacher had to reprimand the **troublemaker** in class constantly.

database

- a large amount of data stored in a computer system in such a way that it can be searched and updated easily
- (1) **database** administrator, (2) employee **database**Each country's officials can access the central **database**.

#### bureau

 an office or agency that specializes in a particular type of work, often related to collecting or compiling data or information

synonym: agency, department, office

#### alcohol

 a clear liquid that can make people drunk and is used in medicines, cleaning products, etc.

synonym: booze, liquor, ethanol

#### tobacco

concoct

to make something, especially food, by mixing or adding different things; to invent a story or plan, especially for a dishonest purpose
