devise

synonym: create, concoct, invent

(1) devise a plan, (2) devise a literary plot

They had to **devise** a system that did not depend on fossil fuels.

eradicate

v. to get rid of or destroy something completely, especially something bad

synonym: destroy, eliminate, exterminate

(1) **eradicate** the deficit, (2) **eradicate** racial discrimination We are trying to **eradicate** this disease from the world.

exterminate

v. to destroy completely, often referring to the eradication of pests or weeds

synonym: eradicate, eliminate, wipe out

disinfect
