She was obsessed with every **minutiae** of her wedding planning, from the flower arrangements to the seating chart.

#### predate

- v. to have existed or happened earlier than something synonym: foredate, antedate, precede
- (1) **predate** A.D. 200., (2) **predate** the modern age The idea of virtual worlds **predates** computers.

#### collide

- v. to hit something violently when moving synonym: clash, slam, contradict
- (1) **collide** head-on, (2) **collide** in midair The interests of the two countries **collide**.

#### tumble

 to fall suddenly, often uncontrollably; to topple or turn over; to decline sharply and quickly in value, quality, or performance

synonym: fall, stumble, plummet

(1) **tumble** down the hill, (2) confidence **tumbles** as unemployment rates rose

The value of the currency **tumbled** against major international currencies.

### ripple

 a small wave on the surface of a liquid, typically caused by an object falling into it or a slight wind

*synonym*: wave, undulation, fluctuation

(1) a **ripple** of laughter, (2) **ripple** in the water Many businesses felt the **ripple** effect of the economy's decline.

radiate

 to spread out or emit something, such as light or heat, in all directions

synonym: give off, scatter, beam

radiate an aura, (2) radiate in all directions
 Roads radiate from the famous building in the center of the

city.

#### snowflake

n. a small, thin, delicate piece of snow; a person, especially a young person, who is perceived as overly sensitive, easily offended, or with an inflated sense of entitlement

synonym: flake, crystal, ice pellet

(1) delicate **snowflake**, (2) **snowflake** pattern
The Christmas tree was beautifully decorated with delicate **snowflake** ornaments.

#### neuron

- a cell that is specialized to carry information within the brain and between the brain and other parts of the body
   synonym: nerve cell
- (1) excite the **neurons**, (2) **neuron** cell body

Our body transfers information along each **neuron** using an electrical impulse.

#### unreliable

adj. not able to be trusted or depended onsynonym: inconsistent, erratic, undependable

(1) prove **unreliable**, (2) **unreliable** source of information By incorrect assumption, statistics can be notoriously **unreliable**.

#### reliant

 adj. needing something or something to continue, to work correctly, or to succeed

*synonym*: dependent, subservient

(1) heavily **reliant** on oil, (2) export- **reliant** economy

The company is heavily **reliant** on its overseas operations for revenue.

excite

- v. to make someone feel suddenly enthusiastic or eager synonym: thrill, exhilarate, animate
- (1) **excite** the crowd, (2) **excite** rebellion The news of her promotion **excited** her.

## rhythmic

adj. having a pattern of regular beats or a regular beat; characterized by rhythm

*synonym*: measured, metrical, cadenced

(1) a **rhythmic** stroking, (2) in a **rhythmic** pace The **rhythmic** sound of the drums was mesmerizing.

#### disinhibition

the reduction or absence of inhibitions or restraints,
 leading to a loss of self-control or restraint in expressing one's thoughts, feelings, or behaviors

synonym: uninhibition, lack of restraint, impulsiveness

(1) social **disinhibition**, (2) dementia-related **disinhibition**His behavioral **disinhibition** after the brain injury has created challenges in his everyday life.

#### chaotic

adj. without any order or organization; extremely disorganized, unpredictable, and confusing

synonym: disorderly, cluttered, topsy-turvy

(1) the **chaotic** economic situation, (2) **chaotic** theory Change is also occurring in Turkey as a result of **chaotic** reform.

### trajectory

n. the curved path followed by an object moving through space

*synonym*: course, curve, orbit

(1) career **trajectory**, (2) a **trajectory** missile

The company has shown an excellent growth **trajectory** over the years.

# reproducibility

 the ability of an experiment, study, or result to be replicated or repeated by different researchers or laboratories, often seen as a key aspect of scientific rigor

synonym: repeatability, replicability, consistency

(1) **reproducibility** measure, (2) scientific **reproducibility** The researchers spent considerable effort to ensure the **reproducibility** of their experiments.

#### emergent

adj. starting to exist or view, or to become knownsynonym: coming, appearing, developing

(1) **emergent** repair of an aorta, (2) an **emergent** republic Extensive areas of **emergent** plants are usually called marsh.

### pandemonium

 wild and noisy chaos, uproar, or confusion; a state of disorder or tumult

synonym: chaos, bedlam, mayhem

- (1) **pandemonium** in the stadium, (2) noisy **pandemonium** The chaotic concert turned into **pandemonium** when the band took the stage.
- tangle n. a confused mass of something twisted together synonym: knot, snarl, entanglement

#### thicket

 a dense group of trees, shrubs, or other plants, often forming an impenetrable barrier; a tangle or cluster of something that obstructs or impedes progress or movement

synonym: thorn patch, bramble, copse
