# rivalry

 competition or opposition between people or groups, especially in sports or business

synonym: competition, contest, struggle

(1) fierce rivalry, (2) rivalry among airlines

The **rivalry** between the two teams was intense and heated.

- adj. universal and including many different types of things;
   related to or associated with the part of the Christian
   Church that has the Pope as its leader

# prestige

 respect and admiration felt or shown for someone or something based on a perception of their achievements or quality

*synonym*: honor, distinction, reputation

(1) national **prestige**, (2) **prestige** company
The university has great **prestige** in the academic community.

#### Renaissance

 a new growth in activity or enthusiasm in anything, particularly art, literature, or music

synonym: rebirth, golden age

(1) artistic **renaissance**, (2) industrial **renaissance**Folk music is now experiencing a **renaissance**.

hail

v. to call out to someone to get their attention, often from a distance; to greet or welcome someone, especially with enthusiasm or admiration; (noun) precipitation in the form of small balls or lumps of ice that fall from the sky

synonym: greet, salute, welcome

(1) **hail** the victorious team with cheers, (2) **hail** forecast People in the area were forced to **hail** a taxi due to the lack of public transportation options.

truce

 a cessation or suspension of hostilities between warring parties, usually for a specified period, as a treaty, armistice, or other agreement

synonym: ceasefire, armistice, peace

The two sides agreed to a **truce** and set down their weapons.

pillage

n. the act of looting or plundering, particularly during times of war or conflict; the theft or destruction of property or valuables; (verb) to rob, loot, or plunder a place or area, usually in a violent and destructive way

synonym: looting, plunder, raid

(1) violent **pillage**, (2) **pillage** gold and other treasures The army's village **pillage** left the residents without food or shelter.

bandit

 a person who robs or steals, often while using violence or threats; a criminal who operates outside the law and steals from others

synonym: robber, thief, outlaw

(1) wilderness **bandit**, (2) notorious **bandit**A group of armed **bandits** attacked the villagers during the night.

opportune

adj. suitable or happening at a time that is suitable or convenient for a particular purpose

synonym: suitable, timely, practical

(1) **opportune** occasion, (2) an **opportune** remark The phone rang at the most **opportune** time.

leash

 a long, flexible cord or chain used to restrain or control a dog (or other animals); a figurative tool used to control or limit someone's behavior or actions synonym: tether, lead, restraint

(1) dog leash, (2) walk on a leash

Make sure to put the **leash** on your dog before walking.

# synonymous

adj. having the same or a similar meaning as another word or phrase

synonym: equivalent, interchangeable, similar

(1) **synonymous** terms, (2) non- **synonymous** mutation The phrase "big shot" and "important person" are **synonymous**.

# plunder

v. to rob or steal, especially by force or in times of war or chaos; to pillage or loot a place or property

synonym: pillage, loot, despoil

(1) **plunder** the enemy's stronghold, (2) **plunder** his reputation

The pirates could **plunder** the ship and steal all of the valuable cargo.

## inconclusive

adj. without any significant results or proof or decision synonym: ambiguous, unsettled, uncertain

(1) **inconclusive** debate, (2) **inconclusive** evidence Climate behavior models are frequently **inconclusive**.

# ruthless

adj. lacking in pity or compassion; willing to do whatever it takes to achieve their goals, regardless of the consequences for others

synonym: heartless, pitiless, merciless

(1) show **ruthless** behavior, (2) **ruthless** brutality
The dictator was known for his **ruthless** tactics and had no qualms about using violence to maintain power.

#### massacre

 n. the brutal and indiscriminate killing of a large number of people; a violent and bloody event that typically results in the death of many individuals

synonym: slaughter, bloodbath, butchery

(1) **massacre** in the village, (2) animal **massacre**The **massacre** of innocent civilians in the war zone was a tragic event.

#### famine

 a severe shortage of food, often caused by drought, war, or economic reasons

synonym: hunger, starvation, drought

(1) famine relief, (2) coal famine

The severe **famine** caused by the drought has left many people without food.

#### revolt

n. to take violent action against authority, especially government or ruler

synonym: rebellion, uprising, insurgence

The people tried to **revolt** to oust the tyrant.

# dynasty

- a sequence of influential leaders who are all from the same family or a period when they rule a country
- (1) **dynasty** of China, (2) during the Ming **dynasty** During the Habsburg **dynasty**, colonization began.

## outclass

v. to be far superior to or surpass someone or something in quality, skill, or performance

synonym: surpass, excel, overshadow

(1) **outclass** by technology, (2) **outclass** her peers The new sports car **outclasses** all its competitors regarding speed and performance.

# gunpowder

- a mixture of substances, including sulfur, charcoal, and saltpeter, that is used as a fuel or explosive
- synonym: ammunition, explosive, bullet
- (1) **gunpowder** paper, (2) smokeless **gunpowder** The invention of **gunpowder** revolutionized warfare.

# weaponry

a collection of weapons (e.g., guns, knives, bombs, missiles, etc.) used or owned by a particular individual, group, military, or country

synonym: arms, munition, artillery
