### plumb

synonym: fathom, dip, sound

#### hotline

 a telephone line that provides immediate emergency or special assistance

synonym: helpline, emergency line, crisis line

The emergency **hotline** is available 24/7 for people in need of immediate assistance.

### resurgence

 the return or growth of something after a period of decline or disappearance

synonym: revival, recovery, rejuvenation

(1) **resurgence** in popularity, (2) **resurgence** of exports After years of decline, the city is experiencing a **resurgence** in economic growth.

#### **fundamentalist**

 a person who adheres strictly to the basic principles of any subject or discipline

synonym: extremist, zealot, hardliner

(1) **fundamentalist** church, (2) political **fundamentalist**He is a religious **fundamentalist** and strictly adheres to the teachings of his faith.

#### accuse

 to charge or criticize someone with a crime or wrongdoing

synonym: charge, blame, criticize

(1) **accuse** his rudeness, (2) **accuse** each other The witness **accused** the defendant of committing the robbery.

#### elitist

adj. believing or showing the belief that some people are naturally superior to others and, therefore, should have more power and privilege

*synonym*: exclusive, superior

(1) elitist mentality, (2) elitist mindset

His **elitist** attitude made it difficult for him to work with people from different backgrounds.

### pundit

 an expert, authority, or knowledgeable commentator who frequently expresses opinions or gives analysis on a particular subject or issue

*synonym*: expert, commentator, punditry

(1) conservative **pundit**, (2) sports **pundit** 

The political **pundit** provided analysis and commentary on the latest election results.

#### steadfast

adj. firm, unwavering, or determined in purpose or belief;
 resolute and loyal even in the face of adversity or challenges

*synonym*: unwavering, resolute, steadfast

(1) **steadfast** commitment, (2) **steadfast** determination The **steadfast** soldier refused to leave his post despite the danger.

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### triangulation

n. the process of determining the location or position of something, such as an object, place, or point, by measuring the angles or distances between multiple reference points or landmarks

synonym: measurement, surveying, trilateration

(1) **triangulation** method, (2) political **triangulation**The archaeologists used GPS **triangulation** to accurately map the ancient ruins.

#### overeducated

adj. having more education than is necessary for a particular job or position

synonym: overqualified, hypereducated, excessively educated

(1) **overeducated** worker, (2) **overeducated** job applicant Despite his impressive academic achievements, some people thought he was **overeducated** and lacked practical experience.

#### wonk

 a person who is very interested in or knowledgeable about a particular subject, especially one regarded as dry or nerdy

*synonym*: nerd, geek, enthusiast

(1) book wonk, (2) tech wonk

The political **wonk** analyzed every detail of the debate.

### quagmire

 a soft, muddy area that is difficult to walk or move through; a difficult or complicated situation; a dilemma or predicament

synonym: morass, swamp, bog

(1) sink into a **quagmire**, (2) **quagmire** debate

The company found itself in a legal **quagmire**, unable to resolve the issue without causing harm to its reputation.

### despoil

v. to strip or plunder something of its possessions or resources; to deprive or rob something of its natural or valuable qualities; to ruin the appearance or integrity of something

synonym: plunder, ravage, loot

(1) **despoil** the natural resources, (2) **despoiled** land
The company's practice of using cheap materials to cut costs
will **despoil** the quality of the final product.

#### puny

adj. small, weak, or frail in size, strength, or appearance; insignificant or unimportant in value or impact

synonym: small, weak, feeble

(1) puny muscles, (2) puny excuse

The weightlifter could easily lift the **puny** dumbbell with one hand.

#### entail

v. to involve or require something as necessary, particularly as a consequence of a particular situation or action; to impose a burden or restriction on something

synonym: involve, necessitate, require

entail legal consequences, (2) entail risks
 The job offer entails a lot of responsibility and hard work.

### impotent

adj. lacking power or ability to change things or to influence a situation

synonym: helpless, worthless, powerless

- an impotent feeling, (2) sexually impotent
   Modern medicine was largely impotent against the disease.
- to try to make someone do something to gain one's favors or influence by giving a gift of money or other inducements

*synonym*: graft, corrupt

(1) **bribe** a politician, (2) **bribe** him with food

He tries to **bribe** the ship's captain to export illegal products.

#### concede

 to acknowledge or admit the truth or existence of something often reluctantly

synonym: admit, acknowledge, allow

(1) concede a territory, (2) concede a pointHe had to concede defeat after losing the game.

#### strife

 n. conflict or disagreement, especially between people or groups

synonym: conflict, disagreement, dissension

(1) at **strife** over the land, (2) civil **strife** 

The country has been wracked by political **strife** for many years.

### well-being

- n. the state of being happy and healthy and prosperoussynonym: health, welfare, happiness
- (1) the **well-being** of a nation, (2) a sense of **well-being** We are responsible for the care and **well-being** of all our employees.

### comprehend

- v. to understand the nature or meaning of something fully synonym: understand, grasp, apprehend
- (1) **comprehend** English, (2) **comprehend** instructions She struggled to **comprehend** complex math problems.

### gregarious

adj. fond of company; sociable; living in groups or communities

synonym: sociable, outgoing, friendly

(1) **gregarious** animals, (2) **gregarious** nature She was a **gregarious** person, always making friends with everyone she met.

### loquacious

adj. very talkative; tending to talk a lot and at length synonym: chatty, talkative, garrulous

(1) **loquacious** chatter, (2) **loquacious** interviewee

The **loquacious** salesman talked for hours without letting the customer get a word in.

endow

 to give a quality, ability, or asset to a person or institution

*synonym*: finance, subsidize, support

(1) **endow** him with the power, (2) **endow** the scholarship Some people believe that human is **endowed** with reason

and capable of distinguishing good from evil.

#### instinct

 an inborn behavioral pattern that is often responsive to specific stimuli; an innate feeling that causes you to act or believe that something is true

synonym: intuition, aptitude, feeling

(1) **instinct** for self-preservation, (2) aggressive **instinct** When faced with a dangerous situation, his initial **instinct** was to flee.

#### ancestor

- n. a person from whom one is descended; a forefathersynonym: forebear, forefather, progenitor
- (1) **ancestor** language, (2) earliest human **ancestor**My remote **ancestor** immigrated to the United States from Ireland in the 1800s.

### peasant

 a farmer or agricultural worker who owns or rents a small piece of land and grows crops, especially in a traditional or undeveloped society

synonym: farmer, laborer, rustic

(1) peasant class, (2) exploited peasant

Many people today romanticize the idea of the simple life of a **peasant**, but in reality, it was a difficult and often harsh existence.

#### frivolous

*adj.* not serious or sensible; silly or unimportant *synonym*: silly, foolish, unimportant

(1) **frivolous** lawsuits, (2) engage in **frivolous** conversation He was accused of being **frivolous** and not taking his responsibilities seriously.

### prolong

to extend the duration or length of something, particularly a period of time or an event

synonym: extend, lengthen, stretch

We need to **prolong** the meeting for another hour to discuss all the issues.

### crucify

 to execute someone by nailing or binding them to a cross, leaving them there to die

synonym: execute, martyr, nail to cross

(1) **crucify** a criminal, (2) **crucify** him for their actions The religious leaders wanted to **crucify** the heretic for his teachings.

#### disembowel

v. to remove the internal organs, especially from an animal or carcass; to gut or eviscerate

synonym: eviscerate, remove organs

(1) disembowel a fish, (2) disembowel an enemy

The lion used its sharp claws to **disembowel** large prey like zebras and antelopes.

#### barbaric

 adj. characterized by extreme cruelty or brutal violence;
 resembling the behaviors or practices of a barbarian or uncivilized society

synonym: savage, cruel, primitive

(1) barbaric treatment, (2) barbaric act

The **barbaric** practice of gladiator fighting was popular in ancient Rome.

### erupt

v. (of a volcano) to become active and eject rocks, smoke, etc.; to start abruptly and violently

synonym: eject, emit, burst

(1) **erupt** in anger, (2) **erupt** into tears

Battles between whites and blacks **erupted** immediately.

#### greedy

adj. having or showing an intense or insatiable desire for wealth, status, power, or food

synonym: avaricious, covetous, grasping

(1) **greedy** person, (2) **greedy** for money

His **greedy** behavior led him to steal from the company.

#### steer

- v. to control the direction or movement of a vehicle; to direct a course of action; to guide or motivate someonesynonym: guide, direct, control
- (1) **steer** a steady course, (2) **steer** a conversation The captain told him to **steer** the ship north.

### empathy

- n. the ability to share another person's feelings or experiences by imagining that person's situationsynonym: compassion, sympathy, tenderness
- (1) full of **empathy**, (2) **empathy** for patients **Empathy** is also necessary to understand history.

### invigorate

- v. to give energy, enthusiasm, or vitality to something or someone; to revitalize or refreshsynonym: energize, stimulate, revitalize
- (1) **invigorate** the economy, (2) **invigorate** the team Exercising in the morning helps to **invigorate** my mind and body.

### sympathize

- v. to express or feel compassion or understanding for someone else's pain, difficulty, or misfortune; to share in someone else's emotions or experiences
   synonym: empathize, understand, commiserate
- (1) **sympathize** with a tragic hero, (2) **sympathize** with their situation

I **sympathize** with your struggles and am here to support you through them.

#### creditor

n. a person, company, etc. to whom a debtor owes money
(1) the creditor's claims, (2) bankrupt creditor
I asked the lawyer to initiate creditor negotiations for voluntary liquidation.

#### kind-hearted

- adj. having a caring and sympathetic nature; characterized by concern for the well-being and happiness of otherssynonym: compassionate, kind, sympathetic
- (1) kind-hearted person, (2) kind-hearted gesture

The volunteer organization is full of **kind-hearted** people who donate their time to help others.

#### neuron

 a cell that is specialized to carry information within the brain and between the brain and other parts of the body

synonym: nerve cell

(1) excite the **neurons**, (2) **neuron** cell body

Our body transfers information along each **neuron** using an electrical impulse.

#### feeble

adj. lacking physical or mental strength; weak or frail; lacking force, effectiveness, or impact

synonym: weak, frail, feeble-minded

(1) **feeble** attempt, (2) **feeble** excuse

The older man's **feeble** voice suggested he was not feeling well.

#### outsider

 a person who is not part of a particular group, community, or society; someone who is considered to be on the periphery or outside of established social circles

synonym: stranger, foreigner, alien

(1) **outsider** perspective, (2) **outsider** artist

Living in a foreign country can make you feel like an **outsider** at times.

#### blacksmith

- a smith who forges and shapes iron with a hammer and anvil
- (1) blacksmith welding, (2) blacksmith shop

The blacksmith shaped a horseshoe on his anvil.

#### dreadful

adj. very bad, unpleasant, or causing fear synonym: terrible, horrible, awful

(1) dreadful accident, (2) dreadful news

The conditions of the prison were **dreadful** and inhumane.

### calamity

- n. a serious event that causes damage, injury, or losssynonym: disaster, tragedy, misfortune
- (1) financial **calamity**, (2) a dire **calamity**The earthquake was a major **calamity** that left many homeless.

### misfortune

an unfortunate event or circumstance; bad luck or trouble

*synonym*: adversity, calamity, tragedy

(1) economic **misfortune**, (2) a string of **misfortunes**The flood was a great **misfortune** to the small town causing extensive damage.

### melancholy

a feeling of sadness, disappointment, or boredom, often accompanied by a lack of energy or motivation

synonym: sadness, sorrow, gloom

(1) feel **melancholy**, (2) nostalgic **melancholy**His **melancholy** mood was apparent to everyone who knew him.

### precarious

- adj. not securely held or in position; dangerously unstable or uncertain; dependent on chance or uncertain conditionssynonym: precariousness, instability, uncertainty
- (1) **precarious** job, (2) **precarious** financial situation She had a **precarious** hold on the ladder and was afraid to move.

### sentimental

adj. connected with or resulting from someone's emotions, rather than reason or realism

synonym: bathetic, drippy, maudlin

(1) in a **sentimental** mood, (2) **sentimental** damage Stop being **sentimental** and always speak the truth.

### tranquility

 a state of calmness or peacefulness; absence of agitation, disturbance, or turbulence; a peaceful or serene environment

synonym: calmness, serenity, peace

(1) the **tranquility** of the environment, (2) feeling of **tranquility** 

She found **tranquility** by meditating in the garden.

#### snore

 to make a loud, harsh breathing sound while sleeping, often due to an obstruction in the airways or other respiratory issues; to sound boring, monotonous, or dull

synonym: doze, slumber, yawn

(1) **snore** in my sleep, (2) **snore** peacefully I couldn't sleep because my roommate **snored** loudly every night.

#### widen

v. to become or make something broader, wider, more extensive

synonym: broaden, enlarge, extend

(1) **widen** in excitement, (2) **widen** a narrowed heart valve He **widened** his investigation into a medical clinic.

#### indefensible

adj. unable to be protected or justified from criticism synonym: untenable, unjustifiable, unsupportable

(1) logically **indefensible**, (2) **indefensible** argument The argument was **indefensible**, and the judge dismissed it.

#### irrational

adj. not based on, or not using reason or clear thinking;(mathematics) a real number that cannot be expressed as the ratio of two integers

synonym: illogical, ludicrous, senseless

(1) an **irrational** request, (2) **irrational** numbers They continued to endure **irrational** treatment by the dictatorship.

### legislator

 a member of a group of people who has the power to make or enact laws

synonym: lawmaker, lawgiver, administrator

(1) a **legislator** appointed by the party, (2) incumbent **legislator** 

Corporate executives and **legislators** are still overwhelmingly men.

### decency

 behavior that is appropriate or suitable in a given context, especially in terms of social norms and moral standards

*synonym*: morality, propriety, decorum

(1) an offense against **decency**, (2) **decency** standards He always tried to act with **decency**, treating others with respect and kindness.

#### heretic

n. a person who holds beliefs or opinions that are contrary to, or at odds with, the orthodox or official doctrines of a particular religion, ideology, or group; someone who is seen as a dissenter or rebel within a particular community

synonym: dissenter, nonconformist, dissident

(1) heretic beliefs, (2) labeled a heretic
The philosopher was accused of being a heretic for his controversial ideas.

### theologian

- n. an expert or student who studies theologysynonym: clergyperson, philosopher, scholar
- Swedish theologian, (2) great theologians
   Death gets more than its share of attention from theologians.

sect

 a group of people who follow a particular religious or philosophical belief system, especially one that is regarded as outside the norm or mainstream

synonym: group, faction, cult

(1) sect beliefs, (2) secret sect

The minority **sect** believed in a set of unconventional religious practices.

#### exterminate

v. to destroy completely, often referring to the eradication of pests or weeds

synonym: eradicate, eliminate, wipe out

(1) **exterminate** pests, (2) **exterminate** communism The government **exterminated** the invasive species to protect native plants and animals.

#### pamphlet

 a small booklet that contains information or arguments about a particular subject

synonym: brochure, leaflet, booklet

(1) propaganda **pamphlet**, (2) **pamphlet** in English The political organization handed out **pamphlets** to raise awareness about their cause.

### circulate

v. to move continuously or freely around a place or closed system

synonym: flow, disperse, rotate

(1) **circulate** a rumor, (2) **circulate** an agenda before the meeting

The fan **circulates** the air in the room quickly.

### jurisprudence

the theory and practice of law; the study and interpretation of legal principles and legal systems

synonym: legal theory, laws, legal system

(1) **jurisprudence** system, (2) modern **jurisprudence**The lawyer's understanding of **jurisprudence** helped her win the case.

#### inflict

v. to cause harm, injury, or suffering to someone or something

*synonym*: impose, levy, administer

inflict a heavier tax, (2) inflict a hard blow
 the storm inflicted significant damage on the town.

### outweigh

v. to be heavier, more significant, or more critical than something

*synonym*: dominate, outrank, overpower

(1) **outweigh** the benefit, (2) **outweigh** our wishes The advantages would undoubtedly **outweigh** the

### disadvantages.

### superfluous

adj. unnecessary; more than what is needed or required synonym: extra, unnecessary, redundant

(1) **superfluous** information, (2) **superfluous** words

The recipe called for a **superfluous** amount of salt and made the dish too salty.

### tyrannical

adj. using power or authority over people, especially in a specific country, group, etc., in an unfair and cruel waysynonym: despotic, oppressive, authoritarian

(1) a **tyrannical** government, (2) a **tyrannical** parent **Tyrannical** Hollywood film moguls can easily rule the movie star's career.

### catchy

adj. pleasing and easy to remember; likely to attract attention synonym: captivating, haunting, memorable

(1) **catchy** nickname, (2) a **catchy** title for a movie This track starts with a **catchy** guitar riff.

#### wrench

- v. to pull or twist something suddenly or violently synonym: twist, turn, bend
- (1) wrench off the lock, (2) wrench my backA deep sigh was wrenched from his chest.

#### mobilize

- v. to make something ready for action or use; to organize people or resources for a particular purposesynonym: activate, rally, marshal
- (1) **mobilize** cooperation, (2) **mobilize** a stiff joint The military **mobilized** troops to the border.

### modernity

- n. the quality or condition of being modern; the state or era of being up-to-date in technology, science, and culturesynonym: contemporaneousness, present-day, contemporaneity
- (1) spirit of modernity,(2) path toward modernityHe was fascinated by the contrasts between traditional life

and the city's **modernity**.

#### diffuse

adj. spread out widely; not concentrated in one place synonym: spread, scatter

(1) diffuse bleeding, (2) diffuse cloud

Direct lighting is preferable to **diffuse** lighting when reading.

#### redound

 to have a favorable or unfavorable impact, effect, or consequence; to contribute or result in something, often something positive

synonym: contribute, result, benefit

(1) **redound** to the team's victory, (2) **redound** to our advantage

His dedication to his work **redounds** to his success.

### reap

 to harvest a grain crop from a field; to obtain something beneficial as a consequence of something that you have done

synonym: collect, harvest, derive

(1) reap the benefits, (2) reap crops

He **reaped** a significant profit from the listing of his company's stock.

### plunder

v. to rob or steal, especially by force or in times of war or chaos; to pillage or loot a place or property

synonym: pillage, loot, despoil

(1) **plunder** the enemy's stronghold, (2) **plunder** his reputation

The pirates could **plunder** the ship and steal all of the valuable cargo.

### rejoicing

n. the expression of joy or happiness; a feeling or state of great joy or delight

synonym: celebration, merriment, festivity

(1) sound of **rejoicing**, (2) **rejoicing** family

There was much rejoicing among the fans when their team

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won the championship.

### mourning

- n. the act or expression of sorrow or grief for someone who has died; a period of time set aside for such grievingsynonym: grieving, sorrow, lamentation
- (1) **mourning** period, (2) **mourning** ritual

  She wore black clothing as a symbol of **mourning** for her grandmother.

woe

- n. significant problems or troubles; great unhappinesssynonym: anguish, despair, suffering

abolish

- v. to do away with completely; to put an end to synonym: cancel, repeal, annul

### spearhead

inconstant

allege

v. to claim or assert that something is true without providing proof or evidence

synonym: claim, assert, state

(1) allege abuse, (2) allege wrongdoing

The prosecution **alleged** that the defendant was guilty of the crime.

### enlightenment

 n. education that results in understanding and the spread of knowledge

synonym: civilization, awareness, sophistication

(1) spiritual **enlightenment**, (2) **enlightenment** activity He finally brought his **enlightenment** to perfection.

#### defensible

adj. able to be defended or justified; justifiable or reasonable;
 capable of withstanding attack or criticism

synonym: justifiable, supportable, vindicable

(1) defensible fort, (2) defensible decision

The lawyer argued that his client's actions were **defensible** given the circumstances.

#### mischief

 playful, minor actions or behavior intended to cause harm, trouble, or annoyance; mischievous behavior that is not intended to cause harm or damage

synonym: impishness, malice, prank

The dog's **mischief** led to the destruction of the living room furniture.

#### trickle

 to flow or drip slowly and in small amounts; to happen or occur gradually or in small quantities

#### infiltrate

v. to enter or penetrate a group, organization, or place covertly or secretly, usually with a specific purpose or goal in mind; to spread or diffuse through something gradually or subtly

synonym: penetrate, sneak in, invade

(1) infiltrate the bloodstream, (2) infiltrate a community

The spy was able to **infiltrate** the enemy's headquarters undetected.

### grandchild

- n. a child of someone's son or daughtersynonym: offspring, descendant, progeny
- (1) **grandchild-grandparent** relationship, (2) **grandchild** development

The grandparents take care of their **grandchild** while the parents are at work.

### appall

- v. to shock or disgust; to fill with dismay synonym: shock, disgust, dismay
- appall the tourists, (2) appall me
   The news of the massacre appalled the entire nation.

#### nonviolence

n. the use of peaceful means, such as civil disobedience or passive resistance, rather than violence to achieve a goal, especially in the context of political or social change

synonym: pacifism, nonresistance, peacekeeping

(1) **nonviolence** movement, (2) **nonviolence** protest Martin Luther King Jr. was a champion of **nonviolence** in the fight for civil rights.

offend

- v. to cause someone to feel upset, angry, or annoyed synonym: insult, hurt, anger

   His rude comments offended many people at the party.

### toleration

 n. the act of allowing or permitting something, even if it is disliked or opposed; the willingness to tolerate or accept different opinions, beliefs, or practices

synonym: forbearance, patience, endurance

(1) **toleration** policy, (2) religious **toleration**The school's policy on religious **toleration** meant that students were free to practice any faith they chose.

### scrimp

v. to be sparing or frugal in spending or using resources; to economize

synonym: save, economize, cut back

(1) **scrimp** on expenses, (2) **scrimp** on time

I had to **scrimp** and save every penny to afford my dream vacation.

### lifesaving

- the act or process of rescuing someone else's life, especially from drowning
- (1) **lifesaving** efforts, (2) **lifesaving** device

The patient needs a **lifesaving** transplant operation.

### unjust

adj. not fair or equitable; lacking in justice or impartiality; morally unacceptable or wrong

synonym: unfair, inequitable

### contraception

- n. the use of methods or devices to prevent pregnancy, typically by blocking fertilization or implantation of a fertilized egg, which options include contraceptives, condoms, intrauterine devices (IUDs), and sterilization procedures
