phonology

n. the study of the sound patterns of a language, including the distribution and organization of speech sounds; the study of the structure and systematic organization of speech sounds in languages

synonym: phonemics, sound patterns, sound structures

(1) **phonology** rules, (2) **phonology** of English The study of **phonology** concerns the systematic organization of sounds in a language.

 a sudden, involuntary muscular contraction or movement, often repetitive in nature; a habitual and often unconscious behavior or mannerism

synonym: twitch, spasm, jerk

phonetic

tic

adj. of or relating to speech sounds or scientific study of speech sound

synonym: vocal, spoken, phonic

syllable

- a single unit of spoken language more significant than a phoneme containing a vowel sound and usually one or more consonants
- syllable structure, (2) single syllable
 Emphasize the second syllable when pronouncing it.

neurodiversity

n. the concept that neurological differences, such as autism or ADHD, are a natural and valuable part of human diversity rather than a disorder or deficiency to be fixed

synonym:

neurodivergence, cognitive diversity

pathological

synonym: aberrant, diseased, abnormal

The doctor was concerned that the patient's **pathological** fear of germs impacted their daily life.

neurobiology

n. a field of biology that studies the structure, function, and development of the nervous system, including the brain, spinal cord, and peripheral nerves encompassing a wide range of research topics, including the molecular and cellular processes involved in neural signaling, the organization of neural circuits, and the neural basis of behavior, cognition, and emotion

synonym: brain science, neural science, neurology

inventive

synonym: malfunction, bug, fault

- the act of making something up on the spot or creating or performing something without preparation
- synonym: spontaneity, ad-lib, extemporization
