#### medicinal

adj. of or relating to the treatment or cure of diseasesynonym: curative, therapeutic, healing

(1) **medicinal** chemistry, (2) traditional **medicinal**The **medicinal** properties of this herb have been known to help with various ailments.

### preclinical

- adj. of or relating to the early phases of a disease when an accurate diagnosis is not possible because symptoms of the disease have not yet appeared; of or relating to the first stage of a medical education
- (1) **preclinical** diagnosis, (2) **preclinical** safety evaluation The doctor suspected that the patient was in the **preclinical** stage of Alzheimer's disease.

# arrhythmia

n. a medical condition in which the heartbeat is irregular, too slow, or too fast, which can cause the heart to pump blood less effectively and lead to a variety of symptoms such as palpitations, fatigue, shortness of breath, chest pain, or even fainting

synonym: irregular heartbeat, dysrhythmia, arrhythmic disorder

(1) **arrhythmia** treatment, (2) heart **arrhythmia**The patient was diagnosed with an **arrhythmia**, causing irregular heartbeats.

# culpa

 guilt or blame, usually referring to legal or moral responsibility for a wrongdoing

synonym: blame, fault, guilt

(1) assign him full **culpa**, (2) **culpa** in mishandling the situation

The CEO resigned, accepting **culpa** for the company's financial troubles.

# unflattering

adj. not showing or representing someone or something in a favorable or attractive way

synonym: unfavorable, unkind, derogatory

(1) **unflattering** comments, (2) **unflattering** portrayal The lighting in the room made everyone's skin look **unflattering**.

### antidepressant

- any of a class of drugs used to reduce feelings of sadness and worry
- (1) an **antidepressant** drug, (2) **antidepressant** effect She has been taking **antidepressants** since her baby died.

#### nerd

 a person who is very interested in and knowledgeable about a particular subject such as computers, mathematics, chess, etc.

synonym: geek, techie, wonk

(1) a computer **nerd**, (2) **nerd** neck He was, by nature, a cyber **nerd**.

#### mislead

- v. to cause someone to believe something that is not true synonym: misinform, delude, belie
- (1) **mislead** him into trusting her, (2) **mislead** the enemy Our troops pulled back to **mislead** the enemy.

#### accuse

v. to charge or criticize someone with a crime or wrongdoing

*synonym*: charge, blame, criticize

(1) **accuse** his rudeness, (2) **accuse** each other The witness **accused** the defendant of committing the robbery.

flick

 to make a sudden sharp movement or hit something quickly with a sharp movement

synonym: snap, tap, flip

(1) flicker candle, (2) flick through pagesHe flicked the light switch, and the room was illuminated.

#### withhold

v. to not give or grant something due, expected, or requested

synonym: retain, hold back, keep back

(1) **withhold** my laughter, (2) **withhold** payment
The government decided to **withhold** the release of sensitive information.

#### chant

 a simple melody or tune, typically one that is repeated or sung in a monotonous way; (verb) recite with musical intonation

synonym: hymn, mantra, (verb) recite

(1) chant melodies, (2) chant in the chapel

The soccer game crowd broke into a **chant** of "Go, team, go!"

#### diffuse

adj. spread out widely; not concentrated in one place synonym: spread, scatter

(1) diffuse bleeding, (2) diffuse cloud

Direct lighting is preferable to **diffuse** lighting when reading.

#### industrious

adj. hardworking, diligent, and persistent in effort synonym: diligent, hardworking, assiduous

(1) **industrious** worker, (2) **industrious** student

He was known to be very **industrious** and would often work late into the night.

# stockpile

a large quantity or reserve of goods or materials that are accumulated and stored for future use, often used for emergency or contingency purposes; (verb) to accumulate or gather a large quantity of something, usually for future use or as a reserve

synonym: reserve, hoard, cache

(1) **stockpile** weapons, (2) nuclear **stockpile** 

The farmer had a huge **stockpile** of hay for the winter.

# complication

 something that makes a situation or condition that is complex or confused

synonym: confusion, complexity, difficulty

(1) **complication** of structure, (2) resolve without **complication** 

He also continued to struggle with serious long-term **complications**.

## euphemism

 a mild or indirect word or expression used in place of one considered to be too harsh or blunt when referring to something unpleasant or embarrassing

synonym: mild expression, implication, circumlocution

(1) genteel **euphemism**, (2) a **euphemism** for death The company used the **euphemism** "downsizing" to describe the layoffs of hundreds of employees.

# pneumonia

- an infection or inflammation of the lungs, typically caused by bacteria, viruses, or other microorganisms
- bacterial pneumonia, (2) viral pneumonia
   She was hospitalized with a severe case of pneumonia.

# write-up

 a written report, summary, or evaluation; an article or piece of writing that provides information or analysis about a particular subject or event; a formal or official document or record

synonym: article, report, review

synonym: lung infection, bronchitis

harass

v. to annoy, torment, or pester persistently; to subject someone to repeated or chronic attacks or unwelcome attention

synonym: pester, annoy, bother

#### rendition

 a performance or interpretation, often of a piece of music or artwork; a version or translation of something into another language or style; the act of surrendering someone to another country for interrogation or punishment

*synonym*: interpretation, performance, presentation

(1) **rendition** of judgment, (2) film **rendition**The singer gave a beautiful **rendition** of the classic song during the concert.

### pretension

 the act of claiming or asserting something, especially without good reason or without evidence; an unfounded or excessive claim or ambition

*synonym*: presumption, pretense, affectation

(1) **pretension** to authority, (2) baseless **pretension**His **pretensions** of being a gourmet were quickly exposed when he could not identify basic herbs and spices.

#### afterward

adv. after the time mentionedsynonym: later, thereafter, following

(1) a few years **afterward**, (2) go there **afterward**We will explain the countermeasure concerning this problem **afterward**.
